GREAT CUNARD TURBINER.

LIVERPOOL, Eng., November 23.—The Cunard line steamer Carmania, the largest turbine steamer afloat, has arrived on the Mersey preparatory to starting on her maiden voyage to New York, December 2. During six hours' continuous run the Carmania easily maintained 10 1/2 knots, while her speed over a measured mile was more than 20 knots. The Carmania is of 21,000 tons register; she is 675 feet long and has 75 feet beam and has accommodations for 3,000 passengers.
