Trials Of McLean, Essery Adjourned Until Aug. 21

Trials of Clifford Ross McLean, 18, of Westview and Erville Essery, 17, of Mt. Pleasant have been adjourned till Monday, Aug. 21.

They are each indicted on three charges: of escaping from custody, of breaking, entering and stealing from the store of H. R. Crockett, Ltd., Summerside, and of breaking, entering and stealing at Dingwell's canteen, Bedoué. Yesterday they appeared in the County Court before Judge L. G. Lewis. Mr. J. Watson MacNaught, K. C., represented the Crown. Mr. F. H. Strong, K. C., represented Essery and Mr. C. D. McCallum represented McLean.

Clifford Ross McLean was first arraigned on charge of escaping custody and pleaded guilty. Erville Essery was then arraigned on the same charge and his counsel made a motion that the indictment be quashed, on the ground that the indictment was defective in that the accused should be represented by counsel when he was asked to elect if he wished to be tried by speedy trial and also on other legal points.

The Court took these objections into consideration and placed this case at the foot of the proceedings. McLean was then arraigned on the charge of breaking and entering at Crockett's jewelry store and pleaded not guilty. He indicated that he was ready for trial and the case was set at Aug. 21. Essery was then arraigned on this charge and objections were taken by Mr. Strong. At this point the Court adjourned to give proceedings till Aug. 21st to give counsel time to prepare their cases.
