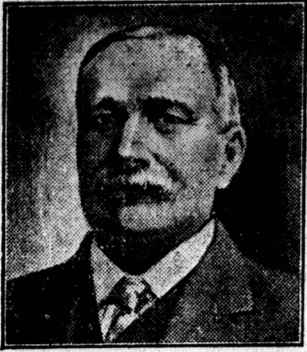

A touching funeral ceremony was held on Sunday afternoon 15th inst. of Paul Arsenault son of Lean S. Arsenault of St. Christostome.
