That Body of Yours

By James D. Burton, M.D. TREATMENT OTHER THAN MEDICAL IS OFTEN HELPFUL

I try not to criticize methods of treatment other than that given by the members of the medical profession because I have seen many despairing individuals helped by these other practitioners.

While it is unfair, criminal, in fact, for any 'hopeful' or faith treatment to be given where there is cancer, tuberculosis, syphilis, diabetes, or other ailment that if treated early means the saving of the life, and overfeed or neglect means loss of life, nevertheless in a great many cases, manipulation of the joints and muscles, the application of electricity or heat in some form, massage, various kinds of baths, bring about both a mental and physical cure.

Careful investigations shows that not less than half of the patients who consult physicians have no curable ailments, yet all receive need some help from the physician. For this reason, Dr. C. F. Martin, Dean of McGill University College of Medicine stated some years ago that "every patient is a mental patient."

It is in this particular that so many physicians, in an effort to be straightforward with their patients, do not hesitate to tell them that there is nothing wrong with them and they have no need, in fact no right to worry or complain as they do. Other physicians, after a careful examination, explain to the patient that as there is nothing wrong, no treatment of any kind is necessary.

But the patient has symptoms and would like attention. If he doesn't get rid of his symptoms and receives no attention he is going to go where he can receive attention of some kind. Thus if he consults a masseur, a physical director, a chiropractor, or a naturopath, he is going to get it.

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MR. DUNCAN DARRACH
On Tuesday morning, Feb. 14, 1938, he passed peacefully away at Marshfield, Mr. Duncan Darrach in his 85th year.

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Public Accounts
Hon. Mr. LePage, as chairman of the Public Accounts Committee, presented the following report:

"To the Honourable the Speaker and Members of the Legislative Assembly.

"Your Committee to report on the Public Accounts for the year ending December 31st, A.D. 1938, beg leave to submit its report as follows:

"Your Committee met and examined the securities held in the Sinking Funds, the Teachers Superannuation Fund, the Carnegie Endowment Fund and the Charitable Housing Account of the Province and your Committee find that the said securities correspond with the lists as shown by the Public Accounts for the year ending December 31st, 1938.

"Your Committee further examined the books and records of the Government of the Province and certify that the gross funded debt, the net funded debt, bank overdraft and loans from the public deposit, as appear in the Public Accounts for the year ending December 31st, 1938, are correct; the total liabilities of the Province as at December 31st, 1938, are \$7,028,924.14.

"Respectfully submitted, (Sgd.) B. W. LePage, L. R. Allen, C. St. C. Trainor, M. A. Newman, Donald MacKinnon, John Mustard."

The report was adopted without discussion. The following bills were read a third time and passed: The Limitation of Actions Act; the Indigent Debtors Act.

Civic Debentures
On motion of Hon. Mr. Prowse the House went into committee with Mr. Wright in the chair, on an Act to authorize the issue of debentures by the City of Charlottetown for the Commissioners of Sewer and Water Supply.

The bill approves and authorizes the expenditure by the Commissioners of \$1,000 for machinery, purification equipment, and warehouse and the issue of additional water works debentures to the amount of \$10,000 in amounts of \$500, twenty year bonds at a rate not to exceed 4 per cent.

The bill was reported agreed to without amendment.

Road Act Amendments
On motion of Hon. Mr. McIntyre the House went into committee with Mr. Stewart in the chair on an Act to amend the Road Act 1938.

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
