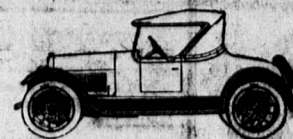

—ANOTHER CUT IN SELLING PRICES.—The United States Corporation, announced another cut the second since April 12, in selling prices for the finished products to correspond with existing prices of competitors. The new schedule reduces bars from \$2.10 to \$1.99; structural shapes from \$2.20 to \$2, and tin plate from \$6.25 to \$5.75. Pipe and possibly some other products will be reduced later. The action taken by the United States Steel Corporation is in line with that inauguration in the last few days by the Bethlehem Steel Corporation, the Republic Iron and Steel Company, Lackawanna Steel Company and many of the smaller producers.

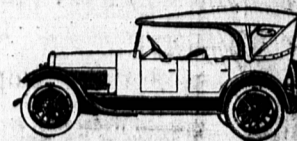
