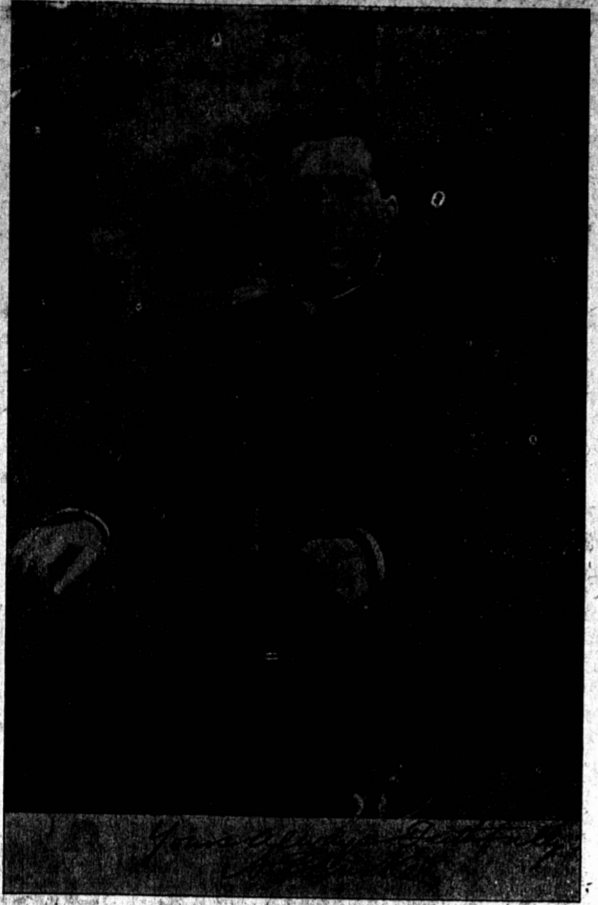

effect that the apples and plums there shown in such endless variety were the best they had ever seen and could not well be excelled anywhere. The exhibition management have very generously recognized the strength of this attraction in placing at our disposal, at our request, a sum from their revenue sufficient to supply a number of substantial prizes for fruit at this show, and I am sure that their action will be highly appreciated and commended by this Association. Should their means permit, having made a beginning, no doubt the amount will be maintained and increased in the future. In the matter of a permanent exhibit of our fruits, long under consideration, I am happy to say that the acting Commissioner of Agriculture, Mr. Cunningham, has given instructions to Prof. Ready, the new Secretary of Agriculture here, to provide for such a necessary work at the earliest possible moment. This will greatly facilitate the matter of identification, always a difficulty with the inexperienced, and be an indication to the stranger of what our Island can produce in fruits. In my last address I had to lament the action of the Canadian Horticulturist in exacting a sum out of our annual fee which precluded us from continuing that excellent journal as our official organ. We were fortunate in getting the Maritime Farmer for our members at a rate while not as low as expected, was still much more reasonable than that offered by the Horticulturist. Now we have had profers of better terms than we then demanded from the Horticulturist, and the Farmer is ready to meet its western competitor on equal terms. The Horticulturist is offered us at sixty cents per year, and being an up-to-date magazine, and devoted entirely to horticulture; it is perhaps the most appropriate official

organ for such an Association as this. The Farmer however, being a journal to hold our patronage, certainly deserves consideration. All the papers on this subject will be placed before you. Strange as it may appear, considerable quantities of fruit have been brought to the Island this Autumn, both from the 5-ber provinces and the States. So it will be imported even when we have a superior article and plenty of it ourselves, for such is the personality of trade. This however, should be remedied in as far as possible. The Mar's Act has greatly protected us against fraudulently packed fruit. Some has reached us however, and Inspector Burke, whose energy is commendable, has been forced to adopt a course which will go far to prevent a repetition of this dishonesty. It would be well for importers of fruit throughout the Province to acquaint the inspectors with every case of fraud, so that purchases may be safe-guarded, and punished and the fair name of Canada upheld. In conclusion I beg to thank the Federal and Provincial Departments of Agriculture for many favors extended during the past year. We have been working along harmoniously, keeping only in view the importance of the industry we have in charge. In so far as they could the officials have helped us to the efficient discharge of our different tasks. In Prof. McMillan, Secretary of the Local Department, we have always a constant friend, who has aided us in our work thoroughly, and in his successful effort to help us, we are glad to recognize a loyal and sympathetic supporter. The monetary assistance we receive, even in the restricted condition of our provincial finances, falls lamentably short of our needs, but there is evidence of late a disposition to acknowledge our usefulness and increase the monetary support given us, which cannot be otherwise than gratifying. We are therefore thankful to the two departments; to Prof. Robertson, that good friend of Horticulture here, whom we see going out with such regret; to the efficient Secretaries of Agriculture who have aided us in the past year; to the City Council for its grant, and to the public men whose ready proffered plums have greatly encouraged the production of fruit. So far as we are personally concerned we have done our best for the proper advancement of Horticulture at home, whilst we endeavored to bear our dear Island's name with honor before the stranger. We have noticed with pride and pleasure the honorable place which the Fruit Growers' Association of P. E. I. has attained in local and continental circles; we are fully persuaded that its merits claim a still higher appreciation which under a more competent and more devoted head it must shortly attain.
