THE CAR FERRY SERVICE.—When the car ferry steamer takes up the service between Port Borden and Tormentine this autumn it is understood that she will make two trips daily except Sunday, leaving Port Borden at 8.55 a. m. and 4.30 p. m. The morning trip would thus give connections with all west-bound early trains from Sackville and the afternoon boat would give connection with the Maritime Express to Montreal and with the night train to Halifax and St. John thus making connection with the early morning train to Boston. The steamer will also make two trips from Tormentine daily arriving at Port Borden on her first trip at 3.45 p. m. and on her second trip at 9.10 p. m. By this arrangement a passenger leaving Halifax for St. John in the morning should arrive in Charlottetown about 5 p. m. and consequently the public will be able to receive the morning papers from these places at a reasonable hour and it is also expected that improved mail arrangements will be brought about.

NEW ROADS OPENED TO AUTOMOBILES

The following additional roads have been opened to motor vehicles by proclamation of the Governor:
All roads on Township No. 4.
The road from the Junction of the Pope Road with the continuation of Central Street leading from Summerside and along such continuation of Central Street north to the Charlottetown Road, thence along the said last mentioned Road through Townsend's Corner to the Road leading to Clermont and also the Condon Road.
The Taylor Road from North Bedeque to Wilmot Valley.
The Road from Central Bedeque Corner to Centreville, thence southwardly to Goodwin's Corner, thence westwardly to Shelton Shore, thence to the Seaport Road.
The Road from Centreville to Truman's Corner, Seaport, including the Road known as the Mill Road.
The Road from Central Bedeque westwardly to Centreville, thence southwardly to Lower Bedeque and extending to Indian Head or McCallum's Point.
The Road from Holland's Corner to Leard's Point, Tryon.
The road leading from Russel Howatt's Corner via Louis Howatt's and S. C. Clark's to the Augustine Cove Road also the Tryon Cross Road via Augustine Cove Road to Muirhead's Corner.
The Bradford Road from the Tryon Road to Cape Traverse.
The Cross Road leading from the Bradford Road to Cape Traverse School House.
The Road from the Bradford Road to Albany Station.
The Road leading from Bradford

on Sundays from One to Six o'clock p. m.
The Road from North Side St. Peter's Bay to Albert Hyndman's Corner, thence via the Cable Head West Road eastwardly, along the North Shore to the Portage Road via McDonald's.
This latter route shall be open to Motor Vehicles on Tuesdays, Thursdays and Saturdays only.
All Roads in Township No. 59 (excepting that portion of the Whim Road between Whim Road Cross and County Line, and the Road from Heatherdale via McRae's Mill to the said County Line.)
All roads in Townships No. 61 and 63 including these portions of the Murray Harbor and Wood Island Roads extending to Caledonia in Queen's County.
Also—The main road between Beach Point and Murray River via Murray Harbor South, Township No. 64.
The above Roads shall be closed to Motor Vehicles on Tuesdays, Fridays and Saturdays—for the remainder of the year.
