S. F. Tarbush, City, has returned from Ontario.

A. Roy of the Marine Department, Ottawa, is in the City.

There were 56 passengers to this City by the Minto yesterday.

During Mayor Prowse's absence Councillor Rogers is acting Mayor.

Mayor Prowse is enjoying a holiday on St. Peter's Island where the shooting is reported good.

The Minto got into port at 10.40 yesterday from Picton, bringing 70 bags of mail.

At a meeting of the session of Christ Church, Sydney, held Tuesday the Rev. J. W. Godfrey of Crapaud, was unanimously elected as rector. It is understood that the Bishop will arrange for Mr. Godfrey's transfer at an early date.

Yesterday the Bill to prohibit the running of automobiles in this Province received its second reading in the Legislature. It went through committee without a hitch, making a record run. It was unanimously passed, and reported agreed to without amendment, and set down for its third reading. Thus is removed the peril of the autos, and the roads of this province will once more be safe for those whose horses have not been able to bear meeting with the machines.

R. R. Chappell, manager of the firm of Chappell Bros. Co., Ltd., Sydney and a native of this Province has gone on an extended trip and intends to visit a number of Canadian and American cities. His first stop will be in New York, where he joins a party of friends who propose to tour the Central States, and thence proceed to California. Mr. Chappell will probably visit Mexico before his return, where he is very heavily interested in a large lumber and grazing proposition.

The Guardian is advised that the Arena Co., intend during the summer months turning their spacious building into an amusement garden where all kinds of high class vaudeville and other attractions will be presented. If this be true it will no doubt be pleasing news to the theatre-going public. The Arena, large, cool and, perhaps the best ventilated building in the Province would be an ideal place in which to hold entertainments of any sort, especially during the warm summer months.

The steamer Bonavista has cleared from Halifax for Cape Breton to load for Quebec. The ice report received by the Dominion Coal company shows that the river St. Lawrence is practically clear of ice below Quebec. There are some fields of ice in the northern strait of the Gulf and Northumberland Strait is jammed. This is probably the last of the ice, and it is working towards Cabot Strait. There is not much ice on the Cape Breton coast, and in a few days it is expected that steamers can safely navigate up the Gulf.

A Wood Islands correspondent writes: The farmers of this vicinity are busily engaged in hauling ice, for dairy purposes. We are all very sorry to hear of the severe illness of Mr. McPherson, who has received the skilful treatment of Dr. McIntyre and Dr. Brehaut. All hope to hear of his recovery. One of the oldest and most respected residents, passed peacefully to his rest on March the twenty-ninth, in the person of John Cornish, in the ninety-third year of his age. Our pastor, Rev. Mr. McKenzie, has gone to Ontario, to visit his old home. A Munn is visiting friends in Belle River. All are glad to see A. J. McMillan out.

In after his severe illness, Wood Islands West school is progressing rapidly under the skilful management of Miss S. J. Woodbridge. Rev. Mr. Stewart has been visiting at his old home in Wood Islands. D. Gillis, has been employed in sawing wood, with his gasoline engine, which is a great help to the farmers. Miss Annie McMillan, has returned home after spending the winter in Charlottetown. A. McDonald of Flat River, is visiting friends in Wood Islands. Miss L. F. MacMillan intends spending the remainder of the winter in Charlottetown.

Bert Smalley, the young man who was found at a Portland street sales stable Boston on Monday last was taken to Arlington and questioned at great length as to his possible knowledge of the murder of Annie Mullins, the Newfoundland girl who was mysteriously murdered in Arlington, March 27th. After the examination, Smalley was not released, the police deciding to hold him for the present, but without preferring a formal charge against him. Smalley has a cast in one eye and admits that he was in Bedford, a small town ten miles from Arlington, two nights before the tragedy. He acknowledges that he was in a drug store in Bedford, but denies that he inquired where Annie Mullins lived. A drug clerk reported last week that a man "with a cast in his eye" asked about Annie Mullins last week. The Boston police say that Smalley said today that he knew the Mullins girl. But Smalley denied later that he is a native of Newfoundland or Nova Scotia, as was at first reported. He says he never was in Newfoundland, but was in the maritime provinces. He met his wife, who was a Miss Addie Clark, of Prince Edward Island, at Halifax. Smalley says he was born in Waterbury, Vt., twenty-eight years ago. He came to Boston five years ago to find work.

The regular quarterly meeting of the Board of Trade of this City was held last evening in the Board of Trade rooms. After routine committee reports were read and referred to the Council to be dealt with. Two new members were enrolled - A. N. McKay and A. M. Peters.

The San Francisco Examiner of a recent date says: "John McLeod, a contracting contractor of 1331 Fifth Avenue, was killed early yesterday morning on the Ocean boulevard after being thrown from his automobile, after he drove it into the rear of a touring car driven by Charles Bowman, a chauffeur. In the machine driven by Bowman were a man and two women, who gave the police fictitious names and addresses. Bowman was arrested and charged with manslaughter, and later released on \$100 cash bail, furnished by his uncle, Benjamin Harris, his partner and keeper of a saloon at Folk and Sutter streets with whom Bowman lives. McLeod was alone in a runabout machine. He had been passing the early night at the resorts along the beach. Shortly after one o'clock he reached the beach road and was driving his machine behind that driven by Bowman. At the narrow part of the road he overtook Bowman and his party, according to Bowman's story, and drove with full force into the big touring car. McLeod's machine struck with such great force that he was thrown over the front and jammed between the two cars. He was crushed about the body so that the ribs were broken and his skull was fractured. The occupants of Bowman's machine were shaken up, but not hurt. They picked up the unconscious contractor and removed him to the Central Emergency Hospital. There he died three hours later.
 When the contractor reached the hospital he was unconscious and did not regain his senses. While he was being operated upon Bowman and the occupants of his machine were taken to the Park police station. Bowman was locked up and the others described themselves as Frank Ford, 854 Presidio Avenue, and Jessie Gray and Violet Lloyd, 1546 O'Farrell Street." The above John McLeod was a son of the late Neil McLeod of Head of Montague, and formerly lived a number of years with A. D. McLeod of Kinross.


