The estate was probated at \$24,300 real estate, and \$76,000 personal property. In addition there is \$14,000 life insurance, payable to the children direct. The total life insurance amounted to \$40,000. Legacies of \$10,000 each are given to his five children; Mrs. F. H. Deacon, Toronto; Henry Reed Emerson, Amherst; Mr. J. T. Cornell, Amherst; Mrs. H. K. Bowers, Ottawa, and Miss Berdice Emerson, at the home, and \$10,000 to the children of H. R. Emerson, Jr. Provision is made for the maintenance of his home as a residence for his mother. She is given \$1,200 a year during her life, \$200 to his servant man, Dominick Belliveau, \$5,000 to his friend and solicitor, James Friel. Mr. Emerson recently provided \$25,000 for the building of a library at Acadia, Wolfville, in memory of his father, Rev. Mr. Emerson.
