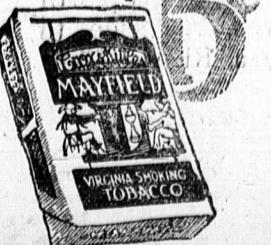

(Associated Press) PHILADELPHIA, Sept. 17.—Physical measurements of Jack Dempsey and Gene Tunney, taken shortly before they completed their training for the championship battle here, reveal how closely the title-holder and his challenger are matched.

The figures show that Dempsey had a six-pound advantage while at the height of the conditioning workouts but this difference is likely to be narrowed by the time they step into the ring. Tunney has a half-inch advantage in height and Dempsey the same margin in reach.
