Mr. Lloyd George, in responding in the House of Commons to questions regarding the Upper Silesian situation and its possible effect on the German answer to the Allied demands, said that while he might not be prepared to agree with the contention that Germany's answer would necessarily be influenced by the Silesian trouble, yet it was very unfortunate that this incident should have arisen at the moment when Germany was deciding as to the disarmament demands. Asked if Great Britain could not do more towards settling the trouble by influencing the Polish Government, the Prime Minister said: "We are doing everything in our power to bring such pressure as we can on the Polish Government."

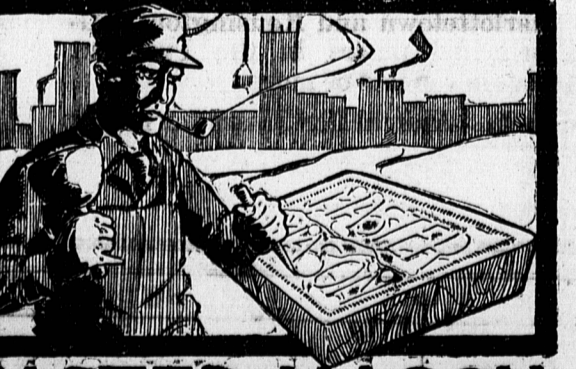
