GIRL GUIDE NEWS

Out of 1,143,000 Girl Guides in the world, there are some 650,000 who wear the navy blue uniform, says the "Guide". Guides of the British Isles, France, Belgium, Latvia, Holland, Japan, Canada, Egypt, Norway and Sweden have chosen this colour. Khaki is worn in Austria, Czechoslovakia, Luxembourg and parts of France and Belgium. Brazilian Guides and Guides in tropical America and tropical parts of the British Empire wear all white uniforms. Some 270,000 Girl Scouts of America wear gray green. Polish Girl Scouts wear brown skirts with light brown tunics.

GUIDING IN AUSTRALIA

Guiding in the great, sunbaked continent of Australia is going ahead by leaps and bounds. Although two-thirds of the population huddles in the six capital cities, the lonely "outback" is gradually becoming dotted with lone blue-clad figures - the Lone Guides. One of the most interesting branches of the Guide Movement in Australia, Lones have been going since about 1918. The aborigines and half-castes also share the thrill of Guiding. Far up in the Gulf of Carpentaria is a Church Missionary Society with a Guide company and a Brownie pack attached. Despite the many difficulties which confront this company - imagine the nearest company is 300 miles across the sea - the girls are all very keen.

MEETING OF CANADIAN COUNCIL

A meeting of the Council was held at Dominion Headquarters on Thursday, September 21st. Lady Falconer was elected as Deputy Chief Commissioner by the Chief Commissioner, Mrs. H. D. Warren. It was announced that a joint institution from the Dominion Council of Boy Scouts and Girl Guides had been extended to the Chief Scout and Chief Guide, Lord and Lady Baden-Powell, to visit Canada in the Fall of 1934.

HONOUR FOR CHIEF COMMISSIONER

Girl Guides of Canada will be interested to learn of the honour which was conferred upon our Chief Commissioner, Mrs. H. D. Warren, when the degree of Doctor of Laws (honoris causa) was conferred upon her by the University of Toronto on the occasion of the reopening of the Royal Ontario Museum. Mrs. Warren received the degree in recognition of her many valuable services.

GUIDES IN TORONTO EXHIBITION

The Guides and Scouts of Ontario had a unique booth at the Canadian National Exhibition in Toronto. It represented a workshop where toys of all kinds and description were repaired by the Guides and Scouts on duty. It was instrumental in drawing the attention of the public to the extensive work which the Guides and Scouts are doing for the underprivileged.

MEMBERSHIP IN CANADA

The total number of registered Companies and packs in Canada numbered 1,724 last April and membership figures totalled 41,882. There are also 358 Local Associations with approximately 1,600 adult members who are helping to supervise and promote Guiding in the areas under their jurisdiction. That Guiding is reaching all types of girls in Canada is shown by the variety in company memberships. There are over 500 Churches with Guide Companies, including Anglican, Roman Catholic, Presbyterian, Baptist, United, Lutheran and Little Britain and 13 Y. W. C. A. Companies and Packs. There are 2 French Companies, 3 Ukrainian Companies and 1 pack, 9 Indian Companies and packs, 2 Chinese Companies, 9 Hebrew Companies and packs, 2 Negro Companies, and a Company of Czechoslovakian Guides. 29 Nationalities work together in one Winnipeg Company, and at Shingle Point Mission on the Arctic Ocean the principles of Guiding are being taught to the Eskimo girls by their teacher who is a keen Guide and who will eventually form them into a Company when they learn the meaning of the Guide Laws.

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PIONEER OF MISCOUCHE PASSES

There passed away on Sunday morning after an illness of over twelve months, Mr. Clement Poirier, one of the oldest residents of Miscoche, at the advanced age of 84 years. Mr. Poirier was a native of Miscoche and had built up a comfortable farm there. He was one of the leading men of the district and in his active years he took a keen interest in agricultural questions; politics and other public matters were closely followed by Mr. Poirier until his last illness. He was a very interesting conversationalist and could tell many stories of the early struggles of the pioneers of Miscoche. He lived with his son, Stanley, on the old homestead, besides this son there are left to mourn one son, Joachim, in the United States, and the following daughters, all residing in Miscoche: Mrs. Peter DesRoches, Mrs. Ernest DesRoches and Mrs. Eli DesRoches, to whom sympathy is extended. Is Seldom Out With Forecast

MONTREAL, Dec. 5 — (C.P.) — In his 96th year and still one of the most accurate weather prophets in Canada is the proud boast of Captain Oliver Patenaude, popularly known from Fort William to the Atlantic as "Daddy of the Lakes." He resides at Beauharnois, Que.

No seaman has ever quite achieved equal fame as a weather prophet with this venerable skipper. Local steamship officials place more confidence in his prophecies than in those of any other man throughout the inland waterways of the dominion, for he is seldom far out in his reckoning.

Despite his more than four-score years, Captain Patenaude's appearance is that of a man much younger. A French-Canadian with great bearing and keen eye undimmed by his advancing age, he was before his retirement one of the ablest pilots on the St. Lawrence. It is recalled by old-timers that Captain "Oliver" was captain of a ship which carried a cargo of furs to Prince Arthur's Landing, now known as Port Arthur, for the construction of the Canadian Pacific Railway.

Capt. Patenaude scooped all the professionals in forecasting the end of a recent cold spell. With the moon hovering around the zero mark and no signs of a let-up, Captain Patenaude forecast almost to the hour the time of the rise in temperature. He bared his predictions on the moon. "When a new moon will shed its light upon the land," he said, "mild weather can be expected." He pointed out there would be a new moon the following day. The next day the moon changed and the weather with it, once more justifying the faith of mariners in this old seaman.
