Governor Hartz Visits Hampshire School

Hampshire School celebrated not only for its talented teacher Miss Dockendorf but for the prize winning school gardens of the province which were visited yesterday forenoon by His Honor Lieutenant Governor F. R. Hartz, Mr. H. H. Shaw, Superintendent of Education and others.

The visitors were met by Mr. Daniel Fraser, chairman of the trustees and after being shown around the grounds and the photos taken called into the school where short addresses were delivered to the pupils.

His Honor expressed his pleasure on being able to address them and heartily complimented them on the appearance of the grounds and gardens. He did not yet know who would win the coveted cup, now won two years in succession by this school, but if they secured it this year it would mean it would remain their property, but naturally they would be defeated in future competitions. He felt sure this would not deter them in their efforts in keeping up the reputation of their school.

His Honor said he had visited a number of schools this summer and he considered Hampshire School was in the lead. He took this opportunity of congratulating Miss Dockendorf, through whose efforts and those of Mr. Fraser and the ratepayers made it possible for this school to head the list during the past two years.

During the course of his remarks His Honor referred to the recent visit of Lord and Lady Willingdon and regretted that the pupils were unable to meet Their Excellencies, who passed through the nearby district but owing to the rainy day it was impossible to make satisfactory arrangements.
