THE mail reached the city yesterday at half past two.

THE Fourth Regiment Band yesterday received a large quantity of new English music published by one of the largest band music firms in the United Kingdom.

YESTERDAY before H. J. Palmer, Throphilus LeClair of Mayfield, Lot 23, was fined \$50 and costs for first violation of the Scott Act. The case was obtained by Prosecutor Brown.

OFFICER ARTHUR HARPER who has been visiting in Kensington informs The Guardian that he saw the wild pigeons, previously referred to, flying through Traveller's Rest at town's end.

WILLIAM HARRIS, Lighthouse keeper at Cape Bear yesterday reported the Minto and Stanley six miles off Cape Bear. The Minto was west of the Stanley which did not seem to have steam up.

THE attention of the City Surveyor is directed to the necessity of opening up the drains in many parts of the city. With the continued mild weather the crossing are in many places almost impassible.

Mr. Clark has completed the Micmac dictionary commenced by the late Dr. Silas T. Rand. This preparation will add much to the efficiency of Mr. Clarke in his work in the West.

RAILWAY EXCURSION AND HORSE RACES ON MARCH 17TH—Geo. A. Sharp Superintendent of P. E. I. R. has kindly consented to issue return tickets at one first class fare from all stations on the P. E. I. Railway good to return on the following day. The attractions in the city will be grand parade of the Benevolent Irish Society and A. O. H. at 10 o'clock and horse races in the afternoon. Two races will take place. Merchants' purse of \$50.00 and entrance money added for free for all trot or pace and citizens' purse of \$25.00 and entrance money added for 2.50 class trotters only. In the evening the fine Irish drama Faugh-a-ballaugh will be put on in the Opera House. These attractions should bring a large number of people to the city on St. Patrick's Day.

Steele, won from the chestnut mare Grace Almont, owned and driven by Victor Douse.

NATIONAL COUNCIL OF WOMEN OF CANADA.

The report from the convener of the Press Committee gives a very encouraging account from the various Local Councils throughout the Dominion.

From the New Westminster Council which has always taken an active interest in hospital work, we hear of the Women's Hospital being freed from debt before it amalgamated with the Royal Columbian, and that four members are elected annually from that Council to serve on the Board of Directors of the Royal Columbian Hospital.

A delegation from the New Westminster Council were welcome guests at the annual meeting of the Vancouver Council which was largely attended. Several of the clergymen were present at both meetings to testify their appreciation of the Council and its work.

The Vancouver Council has appointed a large committee to further the cause of teaching Domestic Science in the schools of that City. It is to furnish and maintain a ward in the General Hospital to be known as the Queen Victoria Memorial Ward.

The St. John Council has appointed a committee to assist the emigrants arriving at this port, a truly national work that will be of benefit to the Dominion and far the best emigrant agent is the emigrant, who, having come and lived the country and its people sends back the word to the old land. The matter of vacation schools and supervised play grounds has been taken up enthusiastically by that Council, the need for the same being much felt in that city.

The annual meeting of the Toronto Council was the largest and most successful ever held. An enjoyable drawing-room meeting was held at Mrs. Massey-Treble's house in honor of Mrs. May Wright Sewall, the President of the International Council of Women, who gave an interesting address upon the wonderfully varied work of all the National Councils throughout the world.

The Victoria (B. C.) Council after many efforts has succeeded in getting the School Board to introduce the teaching of Domestic Science into the schools. The salary will be paid by the Board, and the Local Council will equip and maintain the class room.
