

FACTS ABOUT THE CARE OF CALVES

- 1 A two to six month old calf can drink between 10 to 15 pounds of water a day. Help your calves to get the best nourishment out of their feed by giving them all the fresh, clean water they need.

Trinity United Church Anniversary Sunday

On Sunday next, the 20th inst., Trinity Church, Charlottetown, will observe its anniversary. It is an interesting story to trace the development of this congregation which started with the arrival here of Mr. Benjamin Chappell in October 1778, who organized prayer meetings to be held in his home on Water Street, almost opposite the Lennox Hotel. The province was then known as the Island of St. John, and a garrison of British soldiers was stationed here. There was quite a number of emigrants from London and after the close of the American War a large number of Loyalists came to the Island.

Mr. Chappell's small company of devoted Christians slowly increased in numbers and on their invitation Reverend William Black of Nova Scotia visited here in 1783 and preached on several occasions. Mr. Black was known as "The Apostle of Methodism in the Maritimes." Mr. Black made a second visit about ten years later, then in 1807 the first regular ordained minister, Reverend James Bulpit, arrived from London, England, and entered upon his duties, services being held in the old Court House. Mr. Bulpit continued to reside on the Island after his pastorate had ended. He removed to Crapaud and died there, December 20, 1849, in his eighty-third year. A memorial window was presented by his grand-daughter, Mrs. Hannah Robinson, and can be seen on the north side of our church auditorium, up near the pulpit.

A nice custom is followed at Mount Allison, Sackville, when sprigs of evergreen are strewn on the grave of Mr. Charles F. Allison every Founder's Day. In any case the graves of Mr. Chappell and Mr. Bulpit should be located and given attention, so that their memory may remain ever green.

First Framework Raised

In November 1814 the frame of the first church building was raised — special assistance being given on the occasion by the British soldiers — a Mr. Walter Johnson of Scotland arrived in the year 1820, and spent a year "with the design to establish Sabbath Schools and investigate the religious interest of the country." He records that "the single Sunday School in existence was that of the Methodist at Charlottetown" and that his most ready helpers in his work belonged to the Methodist Community.

As time passed on it was found that the chapel first built was not large enough to accommodate the increasing numbers of the congregation, and so in 1835 a new chapel was opened on Prince Street which subsequently had to be extended and enlarged. On the opening of this new chapel, crowded congregations attended every service. Reverend Mr. Knight of Halifax performed the dedication service and preached from the text "But will God in very deed dwell with men on earth."

The corner stone of the present church was laid on the Queen's birthday, 24th May, 1863, by Lady Dundas, wife of the Lieutenant Governor. "In the name of the Father, and of the Son and of the Holy Ghost." It was erected to the Glory of God and was dedicated for the Worship of God.

and opened on the 13th November, 1884, so this is the 65th anniversary, and it is recorded "The solemnities have left a fragrance upon the mind, and the remembrance of them is sweet. May the bread thus profusely cast upon the waters, at the inauguration of this new sanctuary, be seen after many days." That is the impression which our Minister and our Official Board wish to make as we celebrate the Anniversary event next Sabbath.

Meaning of Anniversary

Anniversary Sunday is one of the notable days on the Church Calendar. It ranks in importance after Christmas and Easter. It is a remembrance day. Reverend Mr. Ibbott, in his address to the Rotary Club recently, is reported as follows: "We should take time to recall and impress upon ourselves the great debt we owe to those Christians who have gone before. These are the real saints, men and women, who, during their lives believe in Christ and do His will. It is to the great mass of anonymous saints that we owe so much. These have no particular days set apart for them, but were to be remembered collectively." That is the true significance of our anniversary — It is a Remembrance Day.

Over sixty-five years ago, the writer attended Sunday School in the basement of the present church. It was a large school, with Reverend F. W. Moore as its Superintendent. The class I attended had as teacher a Mr. Stewart, who was a carpenter by trade, and who I always looked upon as a truly Christian gentleman — one of the anonymous saints to whom Mr. Ibbott made reference.

The church has recently undergone a complete renovation, so that the interior now presents a pleasing and restful appearance. Flowers will adorn the pulpit platform. The choir, under the expert direction of Mr. Albert Dinis, B.A., will have musical numbers, and our Minister, the Reverend H. E. D. Ashford, M.B.E., will have an inspiring message; but as an extra attraction, the Moderator of the United Church of Canada, the Right Reverend Willard E. Brewster, will be with us as Guest Preacher in the evening to tell of the advance made in the first twenty-five years as a United Church. He will be gratified to learn that locally the largest class of Communicants ever to unite with the Church on any previous occasion, presented themselves at the Communion last October.

The centre table which was tastefully arranged with tapers and cut flowers was presided over by Mrs. James McCallum and Mrs. Stephen Connolly.

At the conclusion of the Tea all repaired to the Chapel for Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament which was given by Reverend Father Herrell.
