"Heart Breaker" Nabbed By Cops



A Brantford, Ont., youth described by police as a "heartbreaker to women" is being held by Toronto police in connection with a series of robberies of homes in exclusive residential areas of the west coast city. Louis Molnar, 27, alias Ward, a good-looking young man, faces seven charges of house-breaking in Vancouver and a charge of carrying a revolver which police found in his coat pocket when they raided his \$23 a day suite in a downtown hotel. Vancouver police described Molnar's activities as much like those of Gerrard Dennis of St. Catharines, Ont., who was convicted in connection with house robberies of wealthy U.S. homes. Dennis' loot was figured at \$1,000,000.


