STEAMER WRECKED

(A.P. By Guardian's Special Wire)
NASSAU, N.P., Bahamas, Nov. 17—The colonial government today placed guards over the scattered remains of the British freighter Seven Seas Trader, which pounded to pieces on the rocky shore of Long Island yesterday.

No word was received here of the progress of the 26 members of the stricken ship's crew en-route to Nassau by sailboat, no fears were felt for their safety.

The Seven Seas Trader, bound from Newport News, Va., to Tarifa, in ballast, went aground in heavy seas.

NO DEFENCE IS OFFERED IN TITLED DIVORCE SUIT

LONDON, Nov. 17—There will be no defence to Lord Ashley's suit for divorce in which Douglas Fairbanks, Sr., is named co-respondent, and "the case should all be over in about a half hour," it was learned today from lawyers engaged in the case.

The case is forth on a special jury list opening Nov. 28.

Recently Lady Ashley has been accompanied by Michael Farmer, divorced last week by Gloria Swanson, Hollywood film actress. Another of her ex-husbands has been the youthful Sir Robert Throckmorton.

No damages will be sought by Lord Ashley, but the costs of the action, because of preliminary work, are expected to total \$10,000.

NEW TURK ASSEMBLY EXPECTED TO GRANT FRANCHISE TO WOMEN

ISTANBUL, Turkey, Nov. 17—Votes for women by direct suffrage may be adopted by the prospective new national assembly during 1935, it was learned today.

The present assembly is expected to dissolve itself shortly, ten months before its term expires, in order to permit new elections in January. The next assembly is expected to approve women suffrage as part of President Mustapha Kemal Pasha's campaign to modernize Turkey.

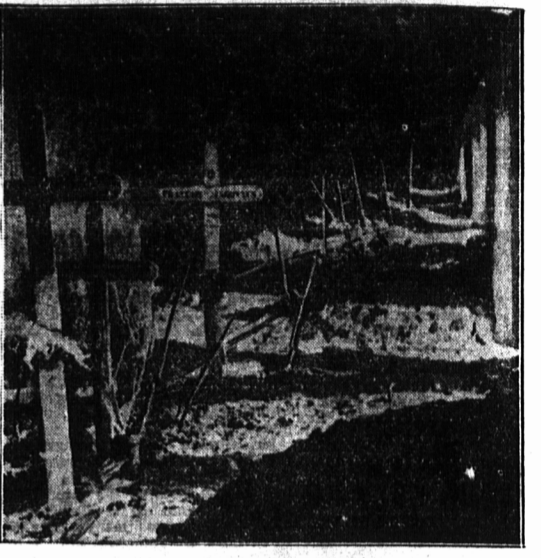
