Following are the grounds for Mr. McQuarrie's application at the Supreme Court for a reserve case in the matter of Ulford Cunningham—That the evidence adduced on the part of the Crown did not make out or prove what is known in law as a "corpus delicti," that is, that they did not prove that Skerry was drowned on the one hand or on the other hand that he was killed by a blow. He pointed out that Dr. Ross' evidence simply amounted to this: he did not know whether Skerry was drowned or not, so far as there was evidence to go to prove that Skerry was drowned, that is, appearances were found on the body such as would be expected to be found on a person who was drowned; that there were three circumstances which went to prove, or raised a presumption of death by drowning (1) That the body was found in the plural cavity (2) There was fluidity of the blood. That Dr. Ross at the preliminary hearing gave it as his opinion under oath that the deceased was not drowned and that he died by violence. On matters of consideration he found the circumstances against him so strong that he withdrew that opinion. Mr. McQuarrie contended also that certain evidence was wrongly admitted against the prisoner at the trial, contending that any evidence of the conduct of the prisoner with the deceased prior to, or subsequent to, the matter charged in the indictment of similar criminal acts could only be given after the prosecution had proved that the deceased died from the blow, the marks of which were found on the scalp and skull, and that blow was administered by the accused. At the conclusion the Chief Justice said that he considered it on the whole desirable that the questions should be fully gone into and would consider whether he would feel justified in granting a reserve case, or leave to appeal, or both.
