mind death, and if I am spared to get home I will be a much wiser man, then before coming here for when a man has been through the valley and shadow of death he is apt to begin thinking and while war is a fearful thing, yet it may not be so fearful as it looks after all, for to see what men endure just for to fight what they think is wrong and without a word of regret die for their ideal. It is worth something I can tell you. I am not sorry that I came, and if I die I think that I have done my duty as I should, and have no regrets. But I have a belief that I'll get through all right, and will be before long able to pay another visit to the Island.

I suppose that the Island regiment is up to strength by now. The Islanders are a rule make fine soldiers. I was in the trenches with some of them some time ago and they sure take to war like ducks to water. The Canadians are fine soldiers, as a rule, daring and resourceful. Some of the stunts they pull out of Fritz are real good. Of course I can't tell just what some of them are, but our fellows are very seldom idle. I suppose you know that the trench fighting is not the old style open war fighting, but a waiting watching game, just like two strong forts and neither one ready to take the offensive, but these forts stretch across the continent from the North Sea to Switzerland. Of course one part of the line can go forward and have very hard fighting, and another never know that a war is on. There is always shelling, bombing parties and mines to lodge on all parts, with an occasional surprise infantry attack, so that when in any front line you are to be very watchful. The Germans also employ gas, and a liquid gas which while terrifying, is not very dangerous. I have seen them all used. We have good protection from those things now, but the first poor fellows who had nothing to guard against such attacks. I think that the most wonderful parts of the war though is the mission and what they do. I have seen airmen go over the lines with shells bursting all around them and never think of turning back and they must live ten years, some days
