Giant Air Planes to Join up British Empire

LONDON, June 10—Giant airships travelling along regular air lines on schedule time will shortly knit more close the outlying points of the British empire. The first step will be the completion of the London-Bombay route, plans for which have been officially approved with the exception of the question of financing the project. An announcement of the proposed line is expected from the Air Ministry in a fortnight. After India has been linked with the British Isles, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa will be joined to the invisible thread of the empire along which the most modern and powerful dirigibles will make regular trips. It will take over a year to put the proposed bi-weekly service to Bombay into effect. Four hundred passengers then can be accommodated on outward and homeward journeys each week. Lighter-than-air craft with a cubic capacity of five million feet each will provide facilities for 200 passengers per trip. A speed of eighty miles per hour will be maintained through the 5,000 mile voyage. First class fare between London and Bombay is expected to be \$290, second class will be little less than half that sum. Capital of \$18,000,000 is sought by the promoters of the scheme and a shell-corporation and Vickers is understood to be offering the necessary amount as soon as the stamp of official approval is put upon the plan. British airmen and army officers are enthusiastic, pointing out the value of such ships in time of war.

PREDICT MACHINES WILL REPLACE HAND LABORERS

CLEVELAND, June 11—A new industrial revolution is going on in America without Americans generally realizing it, according to several leading foundrymen of the country who were here recently to attend the convention of the American Foundrymen's Association.

ESCAPED CONVICT IS APPOINTED JUDGE

Buenos Aires, June 11—An escaped convict should not act as a magistrate—is the belief of the people of the Territory of the Falkland Islands. There is no Arsene Ldpin story in the appointment of a man escaped from states prison to the post of judge of the township of Monte Nieves, an important agricultural community. The appointee did not falsify his documents, he had not changed his name, nor had he redeemed by a long, honest Valcan life his former more or less petty misdemeanors. His presence was tolerated for reasons which the police authorities of the territory may have to explain, and the impunity with which he counted encouraged them to let him have the vacancy of judge. No doubt it was believed that he would have a very useful knowledge of the ways of miscreants. Those who never were in jail felt that the new judge might not be quite so sympathetic towards their little prejudices, such as property rights, security of life and limb and so forth. So all the civic associations have taken up the hue and cry against the convict-judge, and there is a chance that the governor of the state may reconsider.

RADIO INCREASES CATCH OF ENGLISH FISHERMEN

LONDON, June 11—American fishermen off the Grand Banks and the Atlantic coast may find it profitable to emulate the example of their brother fishermen in England who have equipped their vessels with radio. The purpose is to enable them to communicate with the shore or with sister trawlers whenever they discover a shoal of fish too large for their capacity. At a time when a remarkable shortage of fish is reported from the North Sea, some thirty steam trawlers have been fitted with wireless apparatus. It has been found that with the use of radio communication huge hauls, which otherwise would certainly be missed, can be taken in a short time by vessels which are in constant communication with each other and with the shore. The cost of radio installation is insignificant compared to the great catches of fish it makes possible. Also the value of constant communication between the trawler owner ashore, who knows the condition of the market and the skipper at sea is obvious. If one port orders for the catch to be landed at another port. If the catch is unusually heavy, he can make arrangements to facilitate unloading.

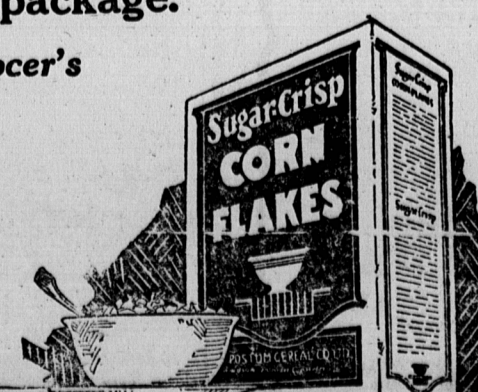
