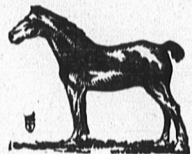

Lay Association Meets At York

The annual meeting of the P. E. I. Lay Association was held in York United Church on July 1st, 1942. The morning service was led by Mr. G. R. Leard and many of those present took part in this very helpful session. Mr. George Shaw led the afternoon devotion service after which the President, Mr. Leonard Cudmore took the chair and called for the minutes of the last conference which was read by the Secretary, W. E. Brooks and on motion adopted.

The report of the Rev. George Murray was then given. The amount of \$361.72 was raised during the last year from fourteen churches in our Island Presbytery.

A program for Lay Sunday, Oct. 4th was then discussed. It was decided to accept the prepared program and that the ministers ask Laymen from the different churches to assist them in these services. Subject for the response, responsibility of the Laymen to the church. After registering those who were present men, women and ministers the different committees were then appointed to report at the evening session.

What is the mission of the church, was the subject for the afternoon discussion, opened by Mr. G. R. Leard. He said that the work of the church was to bring souls to Jesus Christ so that they may know him as their Saviour, as Christ organizer of the church for that purpose. Dr. H. P. Kemp returned Missionary from Trinidad being present followed Mr. Leard on the same subject. Christ told his disciples to go into the world and preach. Christianity cannot be carried on without the Missionary spirit. Every branch of the church must bear fruit or die. The church is Christ heavenly Society and the first leaders that he appointed were his apostles.

The love of God must be in the church, his son to save the world and he has left this work for men and women to carry on. Many laymen present took part in this discussion and agreed that the mission of the church was to save souls and build them up in Jesus Christ.

A number of ministers being present said how much they enjoyed the fellowship of the Laymen in this conference and that all new Orders must be christian Orders.

Evening Meeting

The evening devotional service was conducted by Mr. W. B. Creed after which the President called for the report of the nominating committee which was as follows:

President, Mr. Leonard Cudmore, re-elected.

Vice-Pres. for Queens, Ambrose Mallett, for Lunenburg, W. H. Wightman, for Prince John Moreshead, Sec'y-Treas. W. E. Brooks.

Additional members of Executive C. H. Black and D. N. Nicholson. This report was adopted as read. The resolution committee brought in their regular resolutions and they were also adopted as read. The report of the work of the Maritimes Lay Association was given by the President and he also read his report which he gave before the Maritime Conference at Sackville.

Dr. Kemp then gave a report of the work that Rev. George Murray is doing in Trinidad. Mr. Murray has been supported by the Maritime Lay Association for the last six years and they decided to continue this support for two years longer because of the splendid work that he is doing. He also has a number of helpers who take part in giving religious training in the day schools, one hour each day. He also teaches the natives to teach and preach and hold services where ever possible. His wife is also a great help to him in this work. Mr. Murray has charge of the Presbytery in Trinidad and also has 34 preaching places.

One man built a church on his own farm and the Government built two school buildings at the cost of \$8,000, so that the children might receive better education and training for their life's work. This address was listened to with great attention and for which he received the thanks of all present after conference by singing God Save The King and the benediction was given by Dr. Kemp.

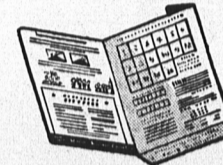

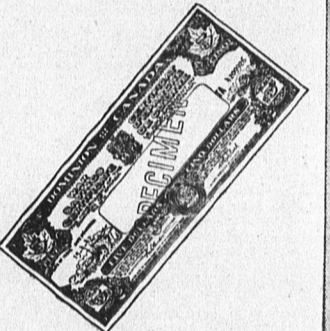
