At Boston, Aug. 16th, Edgar L. Burdett in the 35th year of his age. Mr Burdett was a son of Richard and Mrs Burdett formerly of Dundas, P. E. I., but now of Roxbury, Mass. He was struck by lightning on July 2nd at Edmonton, Alberta, and was removed to the hospital, where he remained for several days. Partially regaining his strength, he decided, with his wife, to visit his parents at Roxbury, on reaching Boston, however, his health was so impaired that the doctors advised his being taken at once to the hospital, where he died the following day. The funeral services were held at the home of his parents, No 276, Dudley St., Roxbury. Mr Burdett was born at Dundas, P. E. I. in 1871 and united with the Baptist church of that place when fourteen years of age, being baptized by Rev W. B. Hinson, M.A. now of San Diego, California. About ten years ago he left home for the Canadian West, where he had a successful career, being at the time of his death, senior partner of the firm of Burdett and Tyler, general merchants of Lloydminster, Sask. He took an active interest in the general welfare of the town and was held in high esteem by his fellow citizens, who nominated him, last year, as Mayor of the town. The Guardian understands that he was largely instrumental in the building of a Baptist church in that place. Besides his sorrowing parents and widow, to whom he had been married only about two years, he leaves two sisters Mrs (Rev) N. A. Whitman of Barrington, N. S., and Mrs John D. McKintion, N. S., and Mrs John D. McKenzie of Phillipsburg, Montana, and two brothers William of Roxbury and Frank of Dutton, Quebec, besides a host of relatives and friends to mourn the loss of one who was greatly beloved by them all.

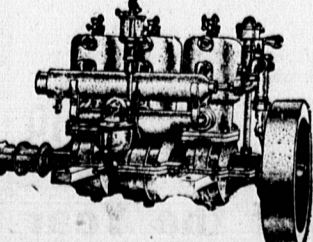
