Guy And Millie Kalmuck Set New Maritime Marks; Runners Are Innovation

Entries Close For Tourney Monday Night

Tommy Bland of Toronto, claimant of the Canadian lightweight championship and Bobby Allen of Westville N. S., will mix it up in a Charlottetown ring some time late in October, according to fight promoter Joey McDonald of this city.

The scrap, sought after by promoters from several leading cities in the Maritimes, was expected to be one of the best boxing matches staged in the seaside provinces for some time, both fighters having good records.

Returning from Boston where he campaigned under the direction of an American manager, the Nova Scotian battler is anxious to disprove Bland's opinion he is the best lightweight in the Dominion. The Toronto boxer is equally anxious to back up his ideas.

Allen showed much improvement Monday night when he entered the ring at New Glasgow and knocked out Wildcat Carter of Boston. Promoter McDonald also announced that entries for Monday's "white hope" tournament to find a heavyweight fighter to fight the winner of the last "white hope" tourney had closed.

Jimmy Evans of Kensington won the last tourney and now he holds the heavyweight championship formerly held by Big George Leslie of Souris.

Besides establishing a challenger for Evans' title, the fight-tuesday night will bring forth a new Prince Edward Island lightweight champion.

Maritime Sports Body In Session

AMHERST, N. S. Oct. 7.—(C.P.)—Appeal of the Saint John Olympic Club for the 1937 Canadian Amateur Track and Field meet was endorsed today by the annual meeting of the Maritime Provinces Branch of the Amateur Athletic Union of Canada.

President Tom MacDonald of Halifax, vice-president, A. A. Chisholm of Moncton and D. W. Fraser of Amherst, and Sheriff C. D. Shipley, of Amherst, secretary-treasurer, were all re-elected to their offices at the sparsely attended meeting.

J. B. Corrigan of Summerside, formerly of Chatham, N.B. was elected vice-president for Prince Edward Island.

Decision was made by the meeting to withdraw temporarily amateur cards from all players actively connected with the out-laid Cape Breton Colliery Baseball League this summer, and another controversy on the circuit was promised for the semi-annual meeting next May. Included among the players suspended were Roy Boyles of St. Stephen, N.B., and Lefty Kerrigan of Saint John.

As a result of the meeting, a resolution will be forwarded to the parent body asking rescindment of a rule allowing amateur teams to play but three games against a professional organization during a season.

Another motion adopted by the meeting was that of William Whitlock, president of the New Brunswick Baseball Association to make all championship baseball games in the Maritimes of nine-innings duration.

Special Fares For Holiday Week-end

MONCTON, N.B., Oct. 7.—Being the last long week-end holiday of the season, the railways are anticipating a heavy passenger travel over Thanksgiving Day, according to R. J. S. Weatherston, general freight and passenger agent of the Canadian National Railways here. Reduced railway fares on the basis of single fare and one-third for the round trip have been put into effect for the holiday, tickets being good going on Friday and up to 2 p.m. on Monday with return limit up to midnight of Tuesday, October 13th.

A fare on the basis of single fare and one-quarter for the round trip will also be in effect good going from noon October 9th until 2.30 p.m. the following Sunday and returning not later than midnight, Monday, October 12th.

The slightly higher fare provides a longer return limit and is also good going any time Friday, October 9th.

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—(AP)—World series ball players scrambled out of the big town today, leaving behind an assortment of conflicting rumors, a horde of second guessers and instructions where to send their world series cheques.

The ageless rumor that Col. T. L. Huston, former part-owner of New York Yankees, would buy Brooklyn Dodgers for a syndicate headed by the Reynolds tobacco interests, was partly spiked by Stephen W. McKeever, 81-year-old president of the Dodgers.

"I have not seen Col. Huston, he has never made me an offer, and the club is not for sale," roared McKeever.

This failed to agree, however, with a statement from Ford Frick, National League President.

"Huston offered \$1,500,000 for the Dodgers last spring," Frick said, "and the Colonel told me during the world series he still was interested."

Baseball Commissioner K. M. Landis started the exodus toward the hunting and fishing grounds. Yankee Manager Joe McCarthy left word he was not to be disturbed.

"I'm going to sleep for a week and then go hunting," he said. Bill Terry, Manager of the Giants, will stay in New York until he has completed the club's spring training schedule and then go to Memphis to have his lame knee treated.

Joe Dimaggio prepared for a vaudeville tour with his ball-playing brother, Vince.

"I'm away behind on my tap dancing lessons," Joe said. "I gotta start working."

With the series over, the rumor peddlers were busy. Central figures in their stories were Rogers Hornsby, reported on the way out as Manager of the Browns; Chuck Dressen, Cincinnati pilot who supposedly does not fit into the schemes of Warren Giles, new general manager of the Reds.

Jimmy Wilson, Phillies Manager, who is rumored to be tottering; and Bill Terry, who is said to be moving into the Giants' front office and turning his old job over to Bill McKechnie of Boston Bees.

Boy Wonder Sought By Many Clubs

NEW YORK, Oct. 7.—(AP)—The baseball world lifted its gaze from world series warfare today and centred it on a baby-faced kid of 17 and a grim, gray thatched judge, chief characters in one of the game's most stirring behind-the-scenes dramas.

As rival magnates crowded the sidelines, clutching bankrolls, eager for a chance to outbid each other, Kenesaw Mountain Landis, High Commissioner of baseball studied the amazing case of Bob Feller, sensational schoolboy pitcher from Van Meter, Iowa.

The Judge had the alternatives of rendering one of these three decisions.

He can rule that Feller is the real property of Cleveland Indians, in which uniform he started baseball with his great pitching genius.

He can rule Feller a free agent, open to deal with the club-owners, who are ready to give him upward of \$100,000 for just signing a contract.

Or the Judge can rule the High School boy the property of the Des Moines club of the Western League. As property of Des Moines, he again would be placed on the auction block for the highest bidder.

The career of the Iowa country town boy is amazing. In his first regular start on the mound for Cleveland, he fanned 15 St. Louis Browns and allowed them two hits last Aug. 23. On Sept. 13 he struck out 17 Philadelphia Athletics for a new American League record.

Feller, a stocky youngster of 185 pounds, was pitching for a farmer's union team in Iowa last year. From the start, his curves tantalized and bewildered batters. Reaching the National amateur baseball tournament at Dayton, Feller drew attention by striking out 18 in one game and 21 in another. Pat Donohue, former Detroit Tiger, rushed to tip Bill Evans, then general manager of the Indians, about the new pitching discovery. Beating 12 other scouts to the draw, the Indians signed Feller.

Make "Killing" At Race Track

TORONTO, Oct. 7.—An ambition to make a "killing" at the races was realized by two persons today at a long branch race track here when the daily double, combining Noisette and Eileen O. paid \$1,887.60 for a \$2 duet.

Surrounded by envious race followers, Charles Roy, Chinese restaurant proprietor of Toronto, and A. Turner of New Toronto, stepped jauntily to the pay-off wicket shortly after the price was posted. Noisette, winner of the first race paid \$16.80 to win. Eileen O. returned \$59.50.

Moncton Britons Defeat 8th Battery In Twin Bill To Reach Softball Finals

MONCTON, N.B., Oct. 7.—(C.P.)—Moncton Britons, New Brunswick Softball Champions, advanced to the Maritime finals today, defeating Charlottetown Eighth Battery, Prince Edward Island titlists, in both ends of a double header played here.

Taking the first game 11-4, Britons made sure of a playoff berth by scoring an 11-6 victory in the second tussle of the best-of-three series.

They next meet Trenton, Nova Scotia Champions, for the Maritime crown, in two games here Friday, the third game, if necessary will be played in Trenton Oct. 12.

Led by the clever hurling of youth Melanson, Britons downed the visitors with an attack which netted them six runs in the seventh and eighth innings of the first game. Kane, hurler for the invading troupe, had a few bad innings in this game, walked 10 batters and allowed nine hits.

Melanson again presided on the mound for the Britons during the second battle, allowing ten hits compared to 18 for Kane. Britons collected seven runs in the last three innings of this contest.

AMHERST, N. S. Oct. 7.—A four-run rally in the eighth inning gave Amherst St. Pats, twice Maritime Baseball Champions, a 5-4 victory over Saint John Falcons today in a series for the 1936 title.

Carrying a 4-1 lead in the eighth inning, the 16th he had pitched in two consecutive days, "Bunny" O'Brien weakened suddenly today and allowed St. Pats five hits that sent four runs across the plate.

The diminutive Saint John southpaw had held Amherst's heavy bats in submission all through the day while his teammates barged out eight hits, scoring three runs in the first inning and another in the second.

The game was a replay of yesterday's which was ended by darkness in the eighth inning with the score 8-8, and gave Amherst a 2-0 lead in games. The series now moves on to Saint John where the third and fourth games probably will be played Friday and Saturday, because of the replay.
