**THE NORTHUMBERLAND.**—The S. S. Northumberland arrived in Charlottetown from Pictou at 8 o'clock last evening.

**RAIN CAUSES LEAKS.**—The prevailing rains have been causing some damage to roofs in the city. Besides the roof of the Market building there is the roof of another public building which is leaking, the Post Office building. The leak centres around the skylight. Repairs are being promptly effected.

**GRAVEL PLANT.**—Having secured their own gravel pit at Surrey, for the purpose of making road-building material, the City Council intend now to get a gravel-screening plant; the screen to be worked by a gasoline engine. The Council have entered into communications with various firms manufacturing this kind of machinery, inviting tenders for the supply of one of these plants, but up to the present have not received any response to their invitation.

**BAPTIST CONVENTION.**—Two Baptist Conventions of the Maritime Provinces open their sessions this week. The United Baptist Women's Missionary Union of the Maritime Provinces meets in annual Convention at St. Stephen's, N. B. The first session was held Wednesday morning, and the meetings will continue until Thursday night. The Union is a strong body and has raised more money for missions this year than any other year in its history. There will be distinguished speakers on the program and the whole problem of missions for the Baptist women of these provinces will be thoroughly gone into. Among the returned missionaries who will be present are Dr. Zella Clark and Miss Martha Clark, of Cavendish in this province. They are home on furlough after very successful terms in India among the Telogooos. They are sisters of Prof. A. Clark of the Experimental Station. Among other from this province on the program are Miss A. A. Wedman, Charlottetown, Mrs. C. H. McLearn, North River, Miss Gamble, Tryon; Mrs. A. Schurman, Bedouque.

**THE AITKEN.**—The Tug William Aitken came in from Pinette yesterday to load coal for the dredge working there. The passage from Pinette to Charlottetown Harbor was very rough, high seas and gusty winds prevailing, mist and rain adding to the unfavorable conditions.

**RABBITS PLENTIFUL.**—Sportsmen who are looking forward to rabbit-hunting will no doubt be gratified to know that reports from various parts of the province are that rabbits are in abundance, and so there is plenty of good sport ahead in this direction. The close season for rabbit-shooting terminates at the end of the present month. Sportsmen have therefore only a fortnight longer to wait in order to be able legally to hunt Bunny. The rabbits are said to be exceptionally plentiful in the vicinity of Suffolk, and Lots 48 and 30; but it is a fact that they are so very abundant this season that wherever there are woods they are to be found in plenty.

**NEW BUOYS.**—Three buoys have recently been placed at the instance of the Dominion Government to define Palmer Inlet, on the North Coast of this Island, a newly formed opening through the sand bars and sand beach five miles southward of Cascumpec light-house. Their position and description are as follows: (1) position.—At entrance of channel, 2 1/2 miles 108 degrees (South 48 degrees 30 minutes Mag.) from Black Point; description.—wooden cask buoy; color.—black. (2) position.—at entrance of channel, 2 1/2 miles, 109 degrees (S. 47 degrees 30 minutes E. Mag.) from Black Point; description.—wooden cask buoy; color.—red. (3) position.—in mid-channel, 2 1/2 miles 111 degrees (S. 45 degrees 30 minutes E. Mag.) from Black Point; description.—wooden cask buoy; color.—black and white.

**AMHERST CONVENTION.**—The general Convention of the Baptist Churches of the Maritime Provinces meets with the Amherst, N. S., Baptist Church on Saturday morning, Oct. 18th. Previous to this a number of the Board and Committees meet to get work prepared for the Convention. The Home Mission Board for Nova Scotia and Prince Edward Island meet on Thursday evening. Rev. Z. L. Fash is a member of this Board. The Foreign Mission Board, and the Maritime Baptist Publication Society, and the numerous other committees have their sessions also. On Friday morning the ministers of the Convention, who numbered last year 305 have their institute. It occupies all day Friday and is a very important meeting. These ordained ministers represent 575 churches with a membership of nearly 65,000 and a constituency of at least three times that number. Dr. Shaler, Matthews of Chicago University will be in attendance at the Convention and will preach on Sunday evening, the 18th. He is a very distinguished writer and speaker. Rev. E. Bosworth of Grande Ligne Mission will be among the speakers, and Dr. J. G. Brown, Secretary of the Canadian Baptist Foreign Mission Board, Toronto, will speak on Tuesday night. Among returned missionaries there will be Rev. H. Y. Corey, Miss Martha and Dr. Zella Clark, Archibald Gordon and others. Dr. Cutten, President of Acadia University, and Dr. DeWolfe, Principal of Acadia Ladies' Seminary and Dr. Archibald, Principal of Acadia Collegiate and Business Academy will give educational addresses. The Convention begins Friday morning and closes Wednesday noon.
