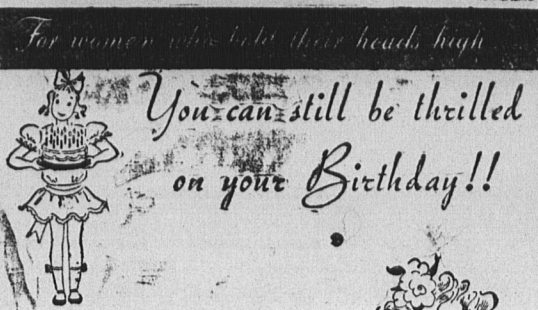

THE COOK'S CORNER

APPLE MOUSSE

1 cup applesauce 1-4 cup sugar, about 1-8 teaspoon salt 1-2 teaspoon mace 1-4 teaspoon cinnamon 1 tablespoon lemon juice 1-2 teaspoon vanilla 1 cup heavy cream

Method: Place the applesauce in a bowl and add the sugar (use more if you desire a sweeter mixture) the salt, spices, lemon juice, and vanilla. Stir well and then set aside for about 15 minutes, stirring occasionally to dissolve the sugar completely.

Method: The rice should be cooked until it is soft but not mushy. Mix together with the drained, crushed pineapple, the marshmallows, apples, and sugar. Allow to stand for 1 hour.

GLORIFIED RICE

2 cup boiled rice 1 cup drained crushed pineapple 1 cup heavy cream 24 marshmallows, quartered 1 cup chopped apples 1-2 cup sugar

Method: The rice should be cooked until it is soft but not mushy. Mix together with the drained, crushed pineapple, the marshmallows, apples, and sugar. Allow to stand for 1 hour.

CHEESE SHORTBREAD

Cream until very soft 1-2 cup butter then add 4-ounce package of nipped cream cheese, and mix well. Then stir together 1-2 cups sifted flour with 1-4 teaspoon salt, and a few grains cayenne pepper.

Work this flour mixture gradually into the cheese mixture to form a dough. It may need a little more flour, depending on the brand of flour used. Chill thoroughly.

Roll out on a floured board to 1-4-inch thickness. Cut in any desired shapes, and bake in shallow tin of 300 degrees until delicately brown. These are delicious plain, but may be put together with currant jam, cranberry or black currant jam.

BRASS STILL GOOD FOR FRENCH DOORS. Although French doors are attractive and desirable, home owners sometimes find it difficult to weatherstrip them. When French doors are in place and moisture penetration occurs at the sill, the doors may be made reasonably watertight and airtight through the use of a four-inch brass saddle or sill with an interlocking metal strip on the bottom of the doors.

NEW FIREPLACE CAN BE "AGED" QUICKLY. If the rough brickwork and mortar of your fireplace is brazen in its newness—or if only part of the brickwork is blackened with smoke and you'd like to have it all dark—here's what you can do: Mix lamp black with kerosene and spray it onto the bricks with a small spray gun—such as you use for murdering mosquitoes. Be careful to stand a sufficient distance from the brick so that the spray doesn't land in splatters.

Don't haul yourself up on a chair by grasping both arms fairly staggering to your feet. Practice getting up and down gracefully without putting hands on the arms of the chair or leaning too far forward as body moves upward.

Sit back in the seat of a chair or taxi. The base of your feet should touch the back of the chair and shoulders should be comfortably relaxed. Straight seated posture isn't necessarily good posture. If you force your feet against the back of the chair, you sit near the front edge of well back, you'll be more graceful than one who slumps.
