WATCH FOR BLIGHT — Dominion Laboratories of Plant Pathology and Entomology, Charlottetown, P. E. I. has sent out the following Bulletin: The drying winds of the past week have prevented the production of spores in the few fields where a mild late blight infection is present. Only one new case, a field in the O'Leary district, has been reported by the inspectors. The abundant moisture now present as a result of the recent heavy rain if maintained by overcast skies and high humidity is likely to induce spore production and subsequent spread of the late blight disease. Growers are advised to examine the late varieties such as Mountains, Sebahago, and Katahdin regularly for disease symptoms. If damp weather persists a spray should be applied inside of a week. The Cobblers are now so mature that further spraying of this variety in most fields is unnecessary. DDT should be applied at regular intervals until the plants die down. This will kill flea beetles and tend to prolong the growth of the plants. It will also reduce the number of aphids which are responsible for spreading mosaic and leafroll.

W L Scott Noted Lawyer Dies At 84 (Ottawa Journal) W. L. Scott, K.C., LL.B., prominent in Ottawa more than 50 years, noted welfare worker and a member of one of Canada's distinguished families, died in Ottawa Civic Hospital following a long illness. He was 84. His father, Sir Richard Scott, was a former Mayor of Bytown, Secretary of State in the Laurier Government from 1896 until 1908 and was sponsor of much constructive legislation including the famous Scott Act, a federal temperance measure still operative. His grandfather was Dr. W. J. Scott, a medical officer in the British Army who on retirement from the service settled in Prescott. On the distaff side, his grandmother was a member of the prominent Macdonnell family of Glenarry.

During a long and fruitful life in Ottawa, Mr. Scott carried on the traditions of his forbears, was a leading counsel at Ottawa courts a champion of minorities and an advocate of the underprivileged particularly underprivileged children. Born at Ottawa, Mr. Scott was educated at private schools and in 1884 received the degree of BA from the University of Ottawa. He then entered upon the study of law at Toronto University, graduating with the degree of LL.B. and was called to the Bar of Ontario in 1887. He commenced practice with his father and the late Judge MacTavish in the firm of Scott, MacTavish and Scott. Appointed Local Master, Supreme Court of Ontario at Ot-

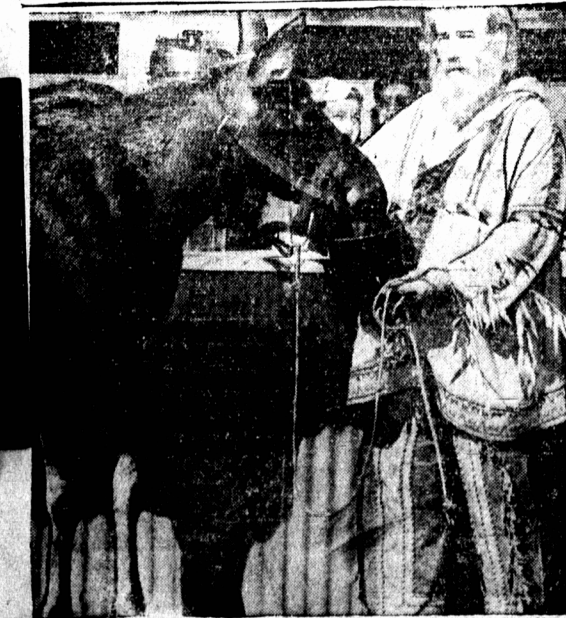

"THE PERILS OF PAULINE" OUT-THRILLS OLD SERIAL

Paramount made its 1947 Technicolor musical production, "The Perils of Pauline," new at the Prince Edward Theatre, even more perilous than the original thrill serial from which the modern film derived its title.

The old time silent flicker included just one "peril" for each of its fifteen chapters. The new production, which also includes the off-screen adventures and romances of Pearl White, the dare-devil serial queen, required the shooting of a total of twenty-three thrill exploits. Fifteen of these, including shots showing the fearless Pearl hanging on a pier on a motorcycle, tied to a railroad track, lashed to a buzz-saw and suspended over a cliff, were condensed into black and white montage shots.

The additional stunts were staged as important scenes and integral parts of the film plot. The picture, which stars Betty Hutton and John Lund, encompasses Pearl's career from her introduction to the cameras to her Parisian days after quitting pictures. So, supplementing the re-creation of the old serial thrills, "The Perils of Pauline" shows such stunts as those performed by Pearl to help sell Liberty Bonds during World War I, and to thrill French audiences at the Casino de Paris.
