Dairy Produce Markets Weaker

The receipts of butter for the week ending June 11, 1921, were 26,731 packages, which show an increase of 11,446 packages as compared with the previous week, and an increase of 6,384 packages with the same week last year, while the total receipts since May 1, 1921, to date show an increase of 24,368 packages as compared with the corresponding period in 1920.

The features of the past week in this department of the trade have been the marked increase in the receipts of butter as compared with the previous one and the same week last year; the accumulation of stock on spot; the falling off in the export movement on account of the very unsatisfactory condition of the sterling exchange situation and the higher prices that have ruled here of late, coupled with the weaker cable advices and the decline in prices in the

English markets that have already been noted in these columns. All the above factors have had a depressing influence on the local situation during the past week and the market on the whole has been weaker, with prices tending towards a lower level, but notwithstanding the conditions prevailing there has been a steady demand from local and export buyers and all the offerings at the auction sales, and on the boards in the country were sold, which resulted in a fairly active trade being done. There was some butter shipped to Bristol last week, but this way claimed to be an old order booked when prices were much lower.

At the auction sales last week the offerings were 6,223 packages, as compared with 4,129 packages for the previous week, and 3,844 packages for the same week last year. The closing prices of these sales show a decline of 1 1/8 cents to 1 5/8 cents per lb., as compared with the final figures for the previous week, pasteurized creamery selling at 29 1/8 cents per lb., finest creamery at 28 1/4 cents and fine at 27 3/8 cents. On the curb market 1,300 packages were sold at 29 3/8 and 28 1/4 cents per lb., for finest and at 26 1/2 cents and 27 3/8 cents for fine delivered here. On the board at Isle Verte 1,000 packages sold at 28 cents per lb., f. o. b., which showed a decline of 1 15-16 cents per lb. as compared with the previous sale, while at Farmham on Saturday prices ruled 1 3/4 cents per lb. lower, and at St. Hyacinthe 2 1/4 cents per lb., below those of June 4.

Local wholesale prices for round lots were quoted as follows: Pasteurized creamery 29 1/2 to 30c. Fine creamery 28 1/2c. to 29c. The receipts of cheese for the week ending June 11, 1921, were 72,485 boxes, which show an increase of 21,443 boxes as compared with the previous week and an increase of 6,911 boxes with the same week last year, while the total receipts since May 1 to date show an increase of 50,771 boxes over the corresponding period in 1920.

A very unsettled and weaker feeling has prevailed in the cheese situation during the past week, which was attributed to the much larger receipts, the weakness in the sterling exchange market and the falling off in the demand from foreign buyers, consequently the market has been much smaller from here and stocks on spot have accumulated to some extent, while the prospects for increased activity in the near future none too encouraging.

The highest prices realized for cheese last week were at the auction sales of Ontario goods held here, when No. 1 white cheese sold at 15 5/8 cents and 14 15-16 cents; No. 2 white at 15 1/8 cents and 14 3/8 cents; No. 1 colored at 15 1/4 cents and 15c, and No. 2 colored at 14 1/2 cents and 14 3/8 cents which were 1 3/8 to 1 7/16 cents per lb. lower for white and 9-16 cents to 5-8 cents for colored, below the last sale of the previous week, while at the boards throughout the country the prices ranged from 13 1/2 cents to 14 7/2 cents per lb. for both white and colored, and in some cases they show a decline of 1 5-16 cents to 2 1-16 cents for lb., and at the same time show that the premium on white goods had almost disappeared.

THE PROVISION MARKET

MONTREAL, June 13.—The course of prices for live hogs in Canada last week was somewhat irregular. At Toronto on Monday the best bids for packers were \$8.50 per 100 lbs., for select fed and watered, but on account of the smaller offerings than the previous advanced 50 cents per 100 lbs. to week sellers refused to figure, and on Tuesday a stronger feeling developed in the market and prices rose to \$9.75, which figures show a net gain for the week of 50 cents to 75 cents per 100 lbs. The Winnipeg market opened 50c. per 100 lbs. lower at \$9, but later reacted 25c. per 100 lbs., closing at \$9.25, a decline of 25 cents for the week. A weaker feeling prevailed in the Calgary market and prices closed 40c. per lbs., lower for the week.
