WILL DEFEND CHINCHOW

NANKING, China, Dec. 31.—(A.P.)—Eugene Chen, China's new Foreign Minister, told the Associated Press today that the government is determined to defend Chinchow against any Japanese attack.

Manchuria never can be independent, he said, because the 30,000,000 Chinese who produce the wealth of that territory have made it so vital a part of China that it never can be separated.

"We will assume all the responsibility for the Manchurian affair," he said, "and after the cabinet is inaugurated tomorrow we will re-ly on stand his ground at Chinchow."

BOSTON, Mass., Dec. 31. (A.P.)—The Boston Bruins, clicking in their old time form, tonight gave the Canadiens a terrific 5-0 beating and gained possession of second place in the American division of the National Hockey League. On their previous visit to the Boston Garden, the world champions were humiliated by a 7-1 margin.

The Bruins scored twice in the opener, on shots by Cooney Weiland and Dit Clapper, who also poked in another tally in the finale. Eddie Shore registered George Owen's assist in the second and Marty Barry, aided by Shore, added to the Frenchmen's heavy load of woe by caging the fifth tally late in the last minute of play.

Labor President Voices Optimism

OTTAWA, Ont., Dec. 31. (By the Canadian Press)—Believing in recent indications of improvement in general conditions throughout the country, Tom Moore, president of the Trades and Labor Congress of Canada, today issued a New Year's message voicing optimism for the future. He urges the necessity of reducing working hours and the maintenance of wages and salaries at the highest possible level as means of continuing the opinion that it is becoming more essential to cultivate the home market in order to offset the situation arising out of mass production. The recent improvement in the price of wheat, though not large, is, he writes, a trend in the direction of better conditions for farmers.

"Whatever changes may occur in Empire trade relations are at least not likely to be to the detriment of Canadian industry," Mr. Moore asserts. "The splendid response to the recent National Service Loan demonstrated that there is money available to proceed with the development of needed public works in Canada, and that the mass of people have faith and confidence in the future of Canada.

"The real importance of these and other similar factors are that they will help to establish confidence which is the only real foundation for progress.

"With Canada's National resources unimpaired, its ability to finance its own undertakings clearly proven, its man power as virile and possessed of as high a technical skill as that of any country in the world, it only needs the application of confidence in the future and determination to spend courageously and wisely both by individuals and public authorities to ensure a continuation of the slight upward trend presently visible.

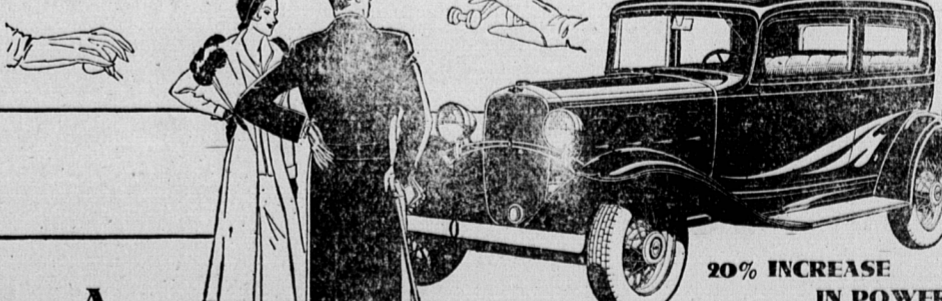

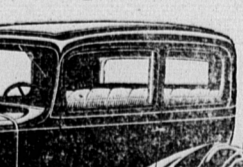
