ANGLO-JAPANESE TREATY PRINTED

It Provides an Offensive and Defensive Alliance for Ten Years, Terminable After One Year's Notice—Korea and India Included—Equal Privilege for all In China

LONDON, Sept. 26.—(Special.)—The full text of the new Anglo-Japanese treaty has been published and this international agreement is of the utmost importance. The preamble sets forth that the treaty is for the consolidation and maintenance of general peace in Eastern Asia and India, the preservation of the common interests of all the powers in China, the integrity of China and for the preservation of the territorial rights and defense of England and Japan in Eastern Asia and India.

PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION OPENED AMID A DOWNPOUR

The First Day Marked by Disagreeable Weather—The Entries Large and Varied—Judging In Progress Yesterday Afternoon—Some Of the Awards—a Big Attendance Looked for Today—Large Crowd Arrived Last Evening

A down pour of rain inaugurated the Provincial Exhibition of 1905 yesterday. In the forenoon the last of the live stock was brought in and housed and in the afternoon the judging of heavy horses was commenced.

The lecturers in the evening were at the Farmers' Pavilion prepared to proceed with the lectures but after consultation with the farmers present it was decided to postpone the addresses till today.

Last night about three hundred persons each came by the train and boat and many are expected today and tomorrow. All now required is fine weather for which everyone earnestly hopes.

FRUIT DISPLAY. As the centre of the fruit display is the county exhibition of different fruits in the form of a pyramid, designed by Miss Nora Ferguson, daughter of Senator Ferguson.

Flowers. The display of plants and flowers is a varied one. Mrs Richard Bourke, Royalty; Miss Lewis, Lewis Point; Mrs John Lewis, Miss McKinnon, Royalty, Mr May Stewart.

SCHOOL DISPLAY. Upstairs in the main building are large displays by Prince School in sets of exam papers, memory maps collections by pupils, mounted wild flowers etc and Kindergarten work and by West Kent and Queen Square in manual training work under the supervision of Prof. Barlow.

PAINTINGS, ETC. The display in this line is pronounced much above the average in quality but possibly there are not as many specimens as in most former years.

LADY'S FANCY WORK. This department in some sections is not as well filled as on previous years. The lace work is particularly worthy of mention as also is the eyelet embroidery and handkerchief work which have been put in the prize list for the first time this season.

JAPS CONDEMN PEACE TREATY

TOKIO, Sept. 22.—The number of memorials to the Throne from different associations and individuals, condemning the peace treaty and asking that it be not ratified exceeds forty, among which is an address signed by six professors of the Imperial University. This memorial strongly urges the necessity for refusing to ratify the peace treaty, and condemns it as entirely annulling the purpose of the war as set forth in the declaration of hostilities.
