"I ain't so small inside, mum, as I am outside," the urchin replied.

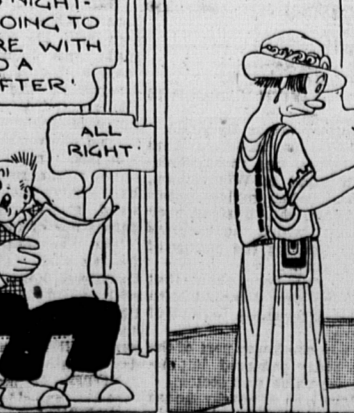

DISINFECTING AND WHITE-WASHING POULTRY HOUSES

(Experimental Farms Note) All poultry houses should be thoroughly cleaned inside before the pullets are put into winter quarters and it is also a good plan to whitewash at least once a year. A valuable disinfectant whitewash suitable for this purpose, and also for hog houses, barn basements, stables, etc. is made as follows: Slaked lime, 1½ pecks; salt, 2 lbs; commercial concentrated lime-

sulphur, 4 gals; water, 40 gallons. For a small quantity the following proportions are suitable: Slaked lime, 1 heaping quart; salt, 3 table-spoons; commercial concentrated lime-sulphur, 1½ quarts; water, 4 gallons. This amount is sufficient for the ordinary single-pen henhouse. One ounce of carbolic acid may be added to this to increase the effectiveness of the mixture. This solution should be forced into every crack and crevice with a spray pump, especially around the nests, roosts, and adjoining walls.

In addition to the yearly whitewashing or disinfecting, dry lime should be scattered on the drop-lime area is to be covered, the application is preferably done with droppings removed daily.
