TO JOIN THE NAVY.—Sub-Lieutenant William S. Gordon, Royal Naval Reserve, son of Mr. and Mrs. Daniel Gordon of this city, leaves this morning en route to England. Mr. Gordon received his naval appointment this week by virtue of his services in the merchant service in which he served for a number of years and visited nearly every quarter of the globe. He has been very anxious to enter the navy and take a share in the big things now transpiring in world-history. The "Hilly" will do his share nobly every body knows. Another brother, "Jack" has been in France for some time nobly upholding the cause of the Empire.

HEROIC ACT.—A heroic act of rescue from drowning was performed at the North Shore on Wednesday afternoon. One of the visitors at McCullum's hotel, who with a number of others, was enjoying a swim in the heavy surf, got beyond his depth, called for help and sank. Coming to the surface again, he again disappeared. Neville Goff, aged 15, a son of Mr. R. C. Goff of this city, pluckily swam through the breakers and secured a hold on the drowning man and headed for the shore. The swim was a difficult one and when he reached terra firma with his helpless load he was pretty well exhausted. The half-drowned man quickly revived and is none the worse of his scare. Mr. Goff's act was witnessed by a number of other visitors and all are loud in their praise of his splendid act. It is hoped that this self-sacrificing and heroic act on the part of a mere boy will be properly recognized.
