WARN INVESTORS IN GOLD STOCK ISSUES

QUEBEC, April 26.—"Before investing money in alleged gold discoveries, let the people be sure that experts have found them to be in accordance with their description. Let the people be wise and take advice from their bank managers, or business men before placing their savings in such enterprises. More than all let them beware of fine talkers." This was the text of a warning issued today by Premier Taschereau regarding gold mines, in fear that the people instead of mines might be exploited as a result of the rush forecast for the coming season.

THIRTY THOUSAND MEN MAY BE LOCKED OUT

LONDON, April 24.—The ship-building employers' federation has given notice of a lockout on April 30 of the members of the boiler-makers, iron and steel shipbuilders, the woodworkers and the plumbers' union, unless the federation of the engineering and ship-building trades intimates before the end of the month that these unions are prepared to accept an agreement with regard to overtime pay right which was offered in the federation and the federation trades a month ago. About 30,000 men will be affected.

RELIGIOUS BODIES TAKEN BACK HOME FROM BRITISH ISLES

DOVER, ENG., April 25.—A great concourse of people, including Baron Moncheur, the Belgian ambassador, to-day witnessed the ceremony of the removal of the bodies of seventy-nine Belgian soldiers who died in England during the war. The bodies were embarked aboard the British cruiser Callope, which proceeded to Zeebrugge, accompanied by four destroyers. Before the removal of the bodies a religious service was held, conducted by Monsignor Carton de Wiart, at which King George, the army and navy were represented.

GOVERNMENT BUYS MONTREAL BUILDING

MONTREAL, April 26.—Montreal La Patrie, a local French language daily, states today that the Federal Government has completed the purchase of the Shaughnessy building, a large office structure on McGill street, in the heart of the business section of this city. The price is said to be between \$700,000 and \$800,000. The building has been used up to the present as offices for the collection of the taxes and for the Montreal address of the Department of Public Works.
