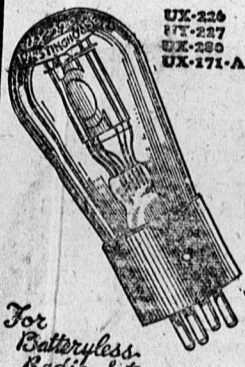

Shaw Dulous Charges Were True

(Canadian Press)

LONDON, Mar. 27—Rt. Hon. Thomas Shaw who was minister of labor in the MacDonald government declared in the House of Commons this afternoon the charges of ill-treatment of British miner-harvesters in Winnipeg last fall, were true. He was referring to the charges made by Tom Johnston, labor member for Dundee, when he was with the Empire Parliament Assn. in Canada last year.

Johnston who sits by Shaw on the front opposition bench had criticized Premier Baldwin for his attacks on nationalization and had declared the prime minister's criticisms of nationalized transportation systems in the dominions would tend to depreciate the dominion's credit in the money market.

"It is a menace to the British Empire that the prime minister for the sake of temporary political advantage should have given facts and figures about nationalized enterprises in the dominions which cannot be substantiated," Johnston declared.

"It is a course which has been protested against by leading representatives of the overseas dominions and because of that we believe continuance of the present government is a menace to the continuance of the British Empire." Johnston's charges brought sharp protests from the Conservatives.
