Revival Of Trading On Silver Market

(A. P. By Guardian's Special Wire) NEW YORK, Dec. 11—Some semblance of order was restored today in world silver trading as the London bullion market was able to resume functioning, aided by a limited revival of United States treasury buying.

After the failure on Tuesday to set a London price, a value was finally established today after some delay at 27 1/2 pence (equivalent to 60.94 cents) an ounce, off 1 1/4 pence from Monday. The leading New York dealer followed shortly by quoting a price for imported bar metal for commercial use at 62 3/4 cents an ounce off one cent from Tuesday.

Unusually wide as was the spread...

between the London and New York valuations, silver circles said there was no evidence of attempts to buy abroad and sell in New York because of the disturbed condition of the market, which made the price of the actual metal on arrival here a matter of uncertainty.

Supply Ship Goes Adrift
