DIVISIONS UNDER NEW ROAD ACT.

House met at 12. Upon motion of Hon. Mr. Peters the Bill to amend the Income Tax Act was read a third time and passed.

Hon. Mr. Gordon asked the Commissioner of Public Works to lay on the table of this House a statement showing the amount paid or agreed to be paid for opening the road at Murdoch McLeod's, Lot 53, the number and names of those employed, the wages paid to each man so employed; and also the number of chains of road operated on in December last.

Hon. Mr. Cumiskey said the statement would be furnished.

Upon motion of Mr. Rogers the Bill to amend an act of Incorporation of the Farmers' and Dairyman's Association of P.E. Island was given its third reading.

Upon motion of Mr. Hughes the Bill to Incorporate the T. A. McLean Mfg. Co. (Ltd) was read a third time and passed.

Upon motion of Mr. Wear the Bill to amend the Incorporation Act of the Tyson Woolen Co. was read a third time and passed.

Hon. Mr. Richards reported for the private Bills Committee on the bill respecting the Trustees of the Cavendish Presbyterian Church in connection with the Presbyterian Church in Canada.

That the property vested in John Simpson, Andrew Clark, William Henry, William Brown, and Jas. Moffat trustees by deed of release bearing date the second day of October, 1832 upon the trust therein set forth be and is hereby vested in the trustees of the Cavendish Presbyterian Church provided always that the said trustees shall not sell or in any way dispose of the said lands mentioned in the section without consent of the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island in connection with the Presbyterian Church of Canada. The recommendation was accepted and the bill was set down for second reading Monday.

Hon. Mr. Farquharson moved that supply be granted to His Majesty.

Hon. Mr. Peters moved the House into committee with Mr. Wear in the chair to take in consideration a bill respecting the act of Incorporation of the Charlottetown Light and Power Company. The bill was reported agreed to without

amendments and set down for third reading to-morrow.

House then adjourned until Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

PRINCE COUNTY.

District Number 1 comprises Townships Nos. 1, 2 and 3, and Roads between Lots 3 and 4.

Number 2 comprises Townships Nos. 4, 5 and 6 and Roads between Lots 6 and 7, 6 and 8, and 6 and 9.

Number 3 comprises Townships Nos. 7, 8 and 9 and roads between Lots 4 and 7, and 5 and 7 and 9 and 10.

Number 4 comprises Townships Nos. 10, 11 and 12 and any roads between Lots 12 and 13.

Number 5 comprises Townships Nos. 15 and 16.

Number 6 comprises Township No. 10 and the Township Line Road between 19 and 23, the line between Lots 13 and 19, and the County Line Road so far as it abuts on Lot 19.

Number 7 comprises Township No. 18 and Princetown Royalty, and the County Line Road from the shore of the Gulf of St. Lawrence to the southern boundary of Lot 18.

Number 8 comprises Townships Nos. 23 and 24 and the County Line Road abutting thereon, and any road on the division line road between Lots 23 and 27.

Number 9 comprises Townships Nos. 27 and 28 and the County Line Road abutting thereon.

Number 10 comprises Townships Nos. 13 and 14 and the roads between Lots 13 and 14 and 13, and 14 and 16.

Number 11 comprises Township No. 17, the roads on the division line between Lots 17 and 19, and between 17 and 15 and 17 and 16.

QUEEN'S COUNTY.

District Number 1 comprises Township Number 20, and all that portion of Township Number 21 lying to north of the Princetown Road.

District Number 2 to comprise Townships Numbers 22 and 27 and all that portion of Princetown Road which lies to the south of Princetown Road.

District Number 3 to comprise Townships Numbers 23 and 24 and the Roads between Lot 22 and 23 and 24 and the road between Lots 65 and 23 leading to Canoe Cove.

District Number 4 to comprise Townships Numbers 33 and 34.

District Number 5 to comprise Townships Numbers 29 and 30, the line road between 30 and 65.

District Number 6 to comprise Township Number 31 and all such part of Lot 32 as does not lie to the eastward of the York or North River and all that part of Lot 65 lying on the north side of the Elliot River.

District Number 7 to comprise those portions of Townships Numbers 35, 36 and 37 on the south side of the Hillsborough.

District Number 8 to comprise Township, Number 48, and those portions of 35, 36 and 37 on the north side of the Hillsborough.

District Number 9 to comprise Townships Numbers 49 and 50.

District Number 10 to comprise Townships Number 57 and all that part to Township Number 63 in Queens County which lies north of South Pinette River.

District Number 11 to comprise Townships Number 60 and 62 and all that portion of Township Number 58 which lies south of the South Pinette River and the County Line Road and that portion of the Line Road from the Junction of the Murray Harbor road at Caledonia to the shore at Little Sands.

District Number 12 to comprise the Royalty of Charlottetown, Poplar Island Bridge, and all that part of Township Number 32 which lies to the eastward of the York or North River.

District Number 13 to comprise all that part of Township Number 65 lying on the south side of the Elliot River, and the Road between lot 65 and 30 leading to Canal Cove.

KING'S COUNTY.

District Number 1 to comprise Townships Numbers 38, 39 and 40 west of Morell River, and the continuation of Byrrows Road to Peake's Road.

District Number 2 to comprise Townships Numbers 41, 40 and 39 east of Morell River, and St. Peter's Harbor's mouth and Morell Bridge, and the Bangor Road South to Peake's Road.

District Number 3 to comprise Townships Numbers 42 and 43, including the Division Line Road between 43 and 44.

District Number 4 to comprise Townships Numbers 44 and 45.

District Number 5 to comprise Townships Numbers 46 and 47.

District Number 6 to comprise Townships Numbers 48 and 49 north of Grand River and Grand River Bridge.

District Number 7 to comprise Townships Number 55 south of Grand River 53 north of Cardigan River; 54 and Boughton Island.

District Number 8 to comprise Townships Number 52 & 51, and Montague Bridge, and 53 south of the Brudenell.

District Number 9 to comprise Townships Numbers 59, 61 and 62.

District Number 10 to comprise Townships Number 63 and 64.

District Number 11 to comprise Georgetown and Royalty and the Common thereon, and the reserved land adjoining the said Royalty, and all that part of Township 53 lying south of the Cardigan River and north of the Brudenell.

BOERS LOST MULE SUIT.

NEW ORLEANS April 15.—Judge Parango in the United States superior court yesterday handed down a decision dismissing the suit for injunction brought by the Boer representatives with a view to preventing the shipment of mules and horses out of New Orleans to the British army in South Africa.

TROUBLOUS RUSSIA.

VIENNA, April 17.—A despatch from Lemberg to the Neues Wiener Journal, asserts that further troubles have occurred in Russia and that wholesale arrests have been made in Odessa and other cities.

The correspondent says also that 5,000 signatures including merchants and land owners have been secured to a petition to Emperor Nicholas to grant a constitution.

KILLED TRYING TO ESCAPE.

CAPE TOWN, April 14.—A New Zealand trooper who was with the Kimberly column followed some Boers into the bush, where he was surrounded, captured, and disarmed except for a revolver he had in his pocket. The trooper was then left in charge of two Boers. Watching his opportunity, the New Zealander shot one Boer dead and wounded the other. The sound of the firing brought back the other Boers, who killed the trooper on the spot.
