GERMANY AND CHINA.

There is even more antagonism between the Chinese and Germans than between the Chinese and any other nationality. Next in order of greatest disfavor are the Japanese, but this is doubtless because China and Japan were so recently at war and Japan was the victor. It will be remembered that in the present trouble the German Minister and two members of the Japanese legation at Peking were the first to be murdered, while the other legations have so far escaped actual destruction.

The causes of the special hostility to Germany date back to 1898, when an expedition under Prince Henry, brother of the Kaiser, seized and held Kiao-Chau, in the Shantung peninsula, and down the coast some 70 miles southwest of the British possession at Wei-Hai-Wei. The murder of two German missionaries was made the pretext for the seizure of Kiao-Chau, which was effected in a rather high-handed and offensive manner. It was at this time that Emperor William made the famous "mailed fist" speech which the world has not yet forgotten. It was at Kiao-Chau and against the German invaders that the first Boxer outbreak occurred. From this point the Boxer rising spread through the Shantung peninsula and north westward to Peking and the great wall, until it assumed its present alarming proportions.

Among the greatest sufferers by the Hull-Ottawa fire of 28th April last was the E. B. Eddy Company, whose vast manufacturing establishments were reduced to ruins. Their loss was of vital interest to many newspaper and publishing houses throughout the country, which were supplied by the Eddy Mills. It is gratifying to learn that with the indomitable energy characteristic of this Company their mills are being restored and it is expected that paper making will begin early in November next. A recent decision of the Chief Justice of New Zealand on the matter of drunkenness has caused some comment in England. His decision is that a man cannot be regarded, legally or otherwise, as drunk, so long as he can ask for more drink, or pay for what is supplied him. One might guess at the reason for so remarkable a decision were it not that the Judge is said to be himself a total abstainer. His decision is precisely that which the average hard drinker makes, that a man is not drunk until he is absolutely paralysed by his potations.

Goldsmith's Deserted Village and The Traveller with prefatory and explanatory notes, has been laid on our table by the publishers, Messrs. Hazard & Moore. The little book is in the Provincial School Series, but many who are long past school age, and especially any whose tastes turn to poetry, may find pleasure and charm in the natural and exquisite, but too much neglected works of Oliver Goldsmith. The mechanical execution of the book is excellent, as is expected from all that emanates from the Sunnyside Press.

According to the London Chronicle both Paris and the Exposition are in a bad way. Firstly the water supply has run short. The streets can no longer be properly cleaned, the gutters and drains are left unflushed, and household cleanliness is rendered impossible for want of water. The Seine itself has almost dried up, and reeks with the the stench of ages. Sewage has been turned into it, and is polluting the country for miles around. Favourite and charming up-river suburban resorts are pestilent with odors that breed epidemics and beget death. Hundreds of people are ill, and the rise in mortality returns is appalling. This is apart from the many who have succumbed to the heat alone, and they may almost be said to be legion. The attendance at the Exposition has dropped fully one-half. Visitors are panting to get out of the parched city and departing trains are taken by storm, while many are forced to remain because the carrying capacity of the trains is insufficient to accommodate the exodus.

The Examiner denies that it ridiculed a night telegraph service. Well, our contemporary has at least made itself ridiculous by opposing that greatly needed improvement. Yesterday its article indicated a measure of shame for its rather stupid and very ill-timed opposition.

Even with the haying unfinished the rain of Saturday would be welcome to our Island farmers. The land had become parched by continued hot, dry weather, pasturage in many places was failing and the milk supply to the cheese factories was diminishing rapidly. The growing crops also greatly needed the rain.

In an article elsewhere in this issue the machinery of a Presidential election campaign is described. It includes a twice repeated house to house canvas of every voter in the Republic, the employment of 60,000 orators supplemented by phonographs, the circulation of hundreds of millions of printed documents, together with flags, buttons, bands, torchlight processions, etc., which will cost the two great political parties a total sum of about \$25,000,000. Those who sometimes speak of the expense of maintaining royalty will perhaps conclude, after reading the statistics of a Presidential campaign, that monarchy is a marvel of economy and cheapness.

A London journal says: South Africa has frequently been described as the burial ground of great reputations; and the present war seems likely to give further point and emphasis to the assertion. One by one our generals there must have felt their fame disappearing, much as Bob Acres' courage oozed out of his fingers. How many of our commanders are likely to return with increased honours and distinction? "Bobs" certainly, albeit these repeated successful attacks on his lines of communication are somewhat trying. Baden-Powell unquestionably, and General French probably. Who also? Kitchener is never heard of; Gatacre and Colville have been recalled; Methuen has been officially whitewashed; and Buller relieved by Roberts, Hart, Clery, Clements, Hunter, Rundle and the rest—where are their hitherto high reputations? We should suppose, that the number of swords of honour, freedoms, and other public honours are likely to be very limited in number.
