THE SIEGE OF PORT ARTHUR.

On its seaward side the siege of Port Arthur may be said to be as old as the war and to have begun on February 8, now more than six months ago. On the night following that day was made the famous torpedo attack in which seven Russian vessels great and small were sunk or disabled. On February 24 the first attempt was made to seal up the harbor entrance by sinking stone laden hulls. On March 9 Makaroff made a sortie with his ships and on March 22 the Japanese fleet bombarded the port and sunk seven more hulks to block the entrance. This effort was ineffectual, however, and on April 13 Makaroff made another sortie, and this time his flagship was blown up and sunk and he with 671 officers and seamen perished. On May 6 a final effort was made to seal up the port by sinking six stone laden ships, but they seem not to have been rightly placed, or the passage was afterwards cleared.

Not only has Port Arthur not been sealed up, but the blockade has been very ineffective. This is largely due to the Russian having sent out floating mines, one of which on May 15 sunk the Japanese battleship Hatsuse with more than half her complement of officers and men. This great loss and danger have since kept the Japanese fleet at a distance of 30 to 40 miles from the entrance. This ineffective blockade has enabled Russian destroyers to come and go through

the entrance, and Chinese junks to keep up an intermittent trade in provisions with the Chinese port of Chefoo, 100 miles away to the south. From the first the Japanese commanders have never entertained the idea of starving the Port Arthur garrison into submission. Probably they had reliable information that the garrison was sufficiently supplied with food to hold out for many months. The recent sortie of the Russian fleet (August 10) and its defeat and dispersal is the one remaining noteworthy feature of the siege from the seaward side.

On the landward side the siege may be said to have begun shortly after the great battle of Nan Shan Hill, May 26 and the occupation of Dalny May 30. But it took some weeks to repair the docks for the landing of siege guns at Dalny, and it was not till June 26 that they succeeded in capturing any of the outworks, the heights about ten miles from Port Arthur. The movements and fighting of the past two months have been veiled in secrecy. The Japanese commander, General Nogai, who succeeded General Oku when the latter was sent northward, has allowed no war correspondents with his forces. The Tokio authorities have no doubt been fully informed, but have kept their own counsel. General Stoessel, in command of the Russian garrison, has all along had communication by wireless telegraph with Chefoo, but neither he nor the St. Petersburg war office can have any accurate idea of the Japanese losses. No doubt the losses on both sides have been great, and those of the Japanese the greater, for there has been stubborn and persistent fighting almost from day to day as one position after another has been taken or attacks repulsed.

All hope of saving the fortress has been abandoned even at St. Petersburg and by General Stoessel himself. A pathetic telegram from him to an intimate friend at Moscow has been recently published: "Farewell forever. Port Arthur will be my grave." There is little sympathy in Canada for the Russian cause, but we cannot withhold our tribute of admiration for the brave officers and men who have shown so much courage and endurance along with a resigned will-negress to die for Czar and country.

We presume a further effort is to be made to reconcile the people to the Hillsboro Street site, which seems likely to prove a hard task.

The Czar to show his joy and gratitude for the birth of an heir proposed to partially abolish flogging, to shorten the sentences of criminals, set free those convicted of political offences whose murder was not committed, and to remit certain fines and arrears due to the state for the purchase of lands. These considerable reforms will be welcomed, but despotic rule will still prevail and liberty as we know it will still be unknown in Russia.

Under Canadian law any person advertising lost or stolen property and announcing that no questions will be asked, and any newspaper publishing such advertisement is liable to severe penalties. The Winnipeg Free Press advertently printed an advertisement of this character and one Kay entered action to recover the penalty of \$250 prescribed by law. The suit was tried by Judge Myers who dismissed the case with \$25 costs against the plaintiff. From a published summary of the trial it would appear that the plaintiff failed to prove that the property in question was either lost or stolen, or that the Free Press was intentionally aiding to cloak or conceal a crime. The Free Press is an ably conducted and highly reputable newspaper and is to be congratulated on the happy and just issue of the litigation referred to.
