IN MEMORIAM

ALEXANDER K. McNEILL

The death of Alexander K. McNeill at Wellington, on the morning of the 27th of February came as a surprise to many of his friends.

For a week or so previous to his death, he complained of not feeling well, but it was hoped he might be spared a while longer, but his extreme old age and weakened condition was against him and almost before those watching at his bedside were aware of it he quietly breathed his last.

Deceased was born ninety seven years ago in South West, Lot 16, and the last surviving member of a family of three sons and three daughters of the late Kenneth McNeill.

He was married sixty two years ago to Isabella McDonald who predeceased him forty two years ago, Sept 13, 1875.

This is the second death in the family within two weeks as his son, Alexander, died on the 14th of February.

He was a man of more than ordinary intellect and always took an active interest in public affairs, a Conservative in politics, in religion a devout Catholic, and although not of an aggressive nature, ready at any time to give reasons for the "faith that was in him."

He leaves to mourn the following family, James A., Albert, and Joseph E. in Wellington, Ambrose and Peter in Maine and one daughter, Catherine A. in Massachusetts.

His funeral took place on the morning of March 1st to Immaculate Conception Church, Wellington, where a requiem Mass was celebrated by Rev. Fr. Connelly. After the service in the church his remains were taken to the adjoining cemetery and all that was mortal of "Alick Kenneth", as he was familiarly known, was laid to rest.

The pall bearers were Roderick McNeill, Raymond Praught, Parnell Cosgrove, Alfonso Conell, David L. Cameron and Collin McDonald. May his soul rest in peace.

Synopsis of Canadian Northwest Land Regulations

THE sole head of a family or any male over eighteen years old, may homestead a quarter section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency.

Duties—Six months residence upon and cultivation of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within nine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions. A habitable house is required except where residence is performed in the vicinity.

In certain districts a homesteader in good standing may pre-empt a quarter-section along side his homestead. Price \$3.00 per acre.

Duties Six months residence in each of three years after earning homestead patent also 50 acres extra cultivation. Pre-emption patent may be obtained as soon as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$500.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.

TO FIGHT AGAINST VENEREAL DISEASES

Bill Introduced into Ontario Legislature Gives Wide Powers to Provincial Board of Health

EXAMINATION OF PRISONERS

Medical Officer of Health May Enter Homes to Make Enquiries and Inspect—Secrecy to be Observed Regarding Names and Addresses

TORONTO, March 7.—The bill for the prevention of venereal diseases has been given its first reading in the Ontario Legislature. The Government has started the machinery for fighting this social evil in this province, and a special committee of the House is to be appointed to consider the bill at its next two readings.

In introducing the bill Hon. J. B. Lucas stated that some three months ago Mr. Justice Hodgins was appointed a commissioner to make a report on the care of the feeble-minded, and also report on the best way of fighting venereal diseases.

Views of Social Workers

"The commissioner has gathered the views of many medical men, social workers and others interested in the matter," said Mr. Lucas, "and this bill was drafted by Mr. Justice Hodgins after a conference with the Government. It does not attempt to solve all the questions that may arise, nor does it assume to go as far as in the end it may be deemed advisable to go, but the bill goes a long way and gives wide powers as to the control of patients. In a general way it throws the whole responsibility for the administration of the act upon the public and municipal health authorities of the province."

Must Have Co-operation

"In the framing of the act we have kept in view the fact that this legislation can only be successful if it has the co-operation of the medical profession generally. We had to consider in this matter that we did not go too far or too fast."

Mr. Lucas stated that on Dr. J. W. McCullough, provincial officer of health, will largely rest the responsibility for the regulations and administration of the act.

New Field of Legislation

"The act leaves a large part of the action to be taken as to regulations and these are left in the hands of the Provincial Health Officer," went on Mr. Lucas. "The municipal health authorities will have the utmost confidence that under Dr. McCullough the work will be conducted under safe and sane lines."

"We are in a new field of legislation, and we have nothing to guide us. We have nothing to work on which will be of assistance to us in this matter."

Mr. Lucas stated that one or two states and countries had made an attempt to deal with the problem, but in none of these cases has there been anything by which this province might benefit. Forty years ago legislation, which had failed and the law was wiped out of the books. It was necessary to have public opinion with them to make this act successful.

No Grants at Present

Mr. Lucas then gave a broad outline of the bill, and in reply to H. H. Dewar, K. C., as to whether the Government contemplated anything in the way of a special grant to hospitals Mr. Lucas said nothing of the kind would be necessary at present.

The bill itself is a long one and the following is an outline of it. The first two clauses give the name of the bill and other minor things.

To Examine Prisoners

Whenever any person has been committed to a jail, reformatory or other place of detention upon conviction for an offence under the Criminal Code of Canada, or under any act of the Province of Ontario, or under any regulation referred to in the next succeeding subsection, the medical officer of health of the municipality or district may physically examine or cause to be physically examined by a legally qualified medical practitioner such person in order to ascertain whether such person is infected with venereal disease.

Whenever any person is under arrest or in custody charged with an offence under any of the statutes or any section thereof, or of any such regulation mentioned in appendix A to this act, if the medical officer of health of the municipality or district wishes, or is credibly informed, that such person is or may be or has been infected with or exposed to infection from venereal disease, the said medical officer of health may physically examine or cause to be examined such person in order to ascertain whether such person is infected with venereal disease.

Detain and Isolate

If upon such examination it is found that the person examined is so infected the medical officer of health shall give such directions for the treatment of the patient, and, if necessary, for his detention and isolation, and the prevention of infection from him, as may be deemed proper or as may be authorized by the regulations, and he is empowered to effect the carrying out of such treatment, detention, isolation and prevention, and it shall be the duty of every patient to carry out such directions as to treatment, and of every constable, jailer, warden, superintendent and officer having the care and custody of the infected patient in any place of detention or in any hospital to see that the directions of the medical officer of health are duly carried out.

Jail Doctor to Report

Every physician in medical charge of any jail or place of detention must report to the medical health officer

the name and place of detention, whether before or after conviction, of any person whom he suspects or believes to be suffering from venereal disease. The report to be made within 24 hours of the time of the arrival of the person at the place.

A medical health officer is to report to the district officer of health whenever he is informed or believes that a person resident in his municipality or district is infected with venereal disease, has infected others or is liable to infect others, and if notified by the district officer of health may give notice in writing to the person requiring him to consult a legally qualified medical practitioner and to procure and produce to the officer within a specified time a report or certificate that he is not suffering from venereal disease. If the certificate is not forthcoming in the specified time the officer of health may authorize a legally qualified practitioner to examine such person and report to him.

If the certificate shows that the person is infected with venereal disease then the medical officer of health may exercise the duties vested in him in the preceding sections to such extent as he may deem it necessary for the public interest.

Examine from Time to Time

If the person produces a certificate from a legally qualified practitioner showing that he is suffering from venereal disease the medical officer of health may send directions as to the course of conduct to be pursued by such person and may require him to produce from time to time such evidence as may be deemed advisable that such person is undergoing proper medical treatment. In case any person fails to comply with the course of conduct prescribed by the medical officer of health may exercise all of the powers vested in him by Section 3 of this Act.

No report or certificate that a person is suffering from venereal disease given by a legally qualified medical practitioner shall render him liable to an action in civil or criminal proceedings.

May Enter Homes

The medical officer of health or a legally qualified practitioner appointed by him, may enter in and upon any house, out-house or premises in the daytime for the purpose of making enquiry and examination with respect to the state of the health of any person therein, and if any person is found infected with any venereal disease may cause them to be removed or give directions to prevent any other people becoming infected.

Treat Free, or no Grant

Every hospital receiving aid from the province shall make effective provision for the examination and treatment free of charge of such persons suffering from venereal diseases as may be declared fit to be treated in such hospitals. In case of default the Provincial Treasurer may withhold part or all of the grant.

The Lieutenant Governor in Council to have power to designate any hospital or public institution as a hospital or place for the detention or isolation of persons suffering from venereal disease.

Shuts Out Quacks

No person but a legally qualified medical practitioner shall attend or prescribe for or supply or offer to supply any drug, medicine, appliance or treatment to a person suffering from venereal disease, for the purpose of alleviation or cure of such diseases.

Every person guilty of a contravention of this to be subject to a penalty of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500.

This, however, shall not apply to a registered pharmaceutical chemist, who dispenses to a patient of a legally qualified practitioner, the prescription of such practitioner or who sells any patent or proprietary medicine, etc., approved by the regulations.

Can't Publish Testimonials

Any person who publishes in a newspaper or magazine or other publication any notice or advertisement, statement or testimonial, letter of other matter shall incur a penalty of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500, or in default 12 months' imprisonment.

This also applies to any person who issues or publishes any book, almanac, pamphlet, flysheet, document or other matter, who posts up or exhibits so as to be visible to people passing along the highway, any notice, sign, statement, advertisement, testimonial, letter, or who distributes, circulates, delivers or sends by post such pamphlet, letters, etc., intended to recommend or suggest the purchase of any article as a drug, medicine, appliance or instrument as part of any treatment for the alleviation or cure of any venereal disease. This does not apply to any article approved by the regulations or any books, etc., published in good faith for the advancement of medical or surgical science.

But before any prosecution of a newspaper proprietor, publisher or printer for printing these notices, etc., takes place, the board shall notify the parties that they have committed an infringement of the act, and he shall not be liable to prosecution unless he does it again after notification.

Up to Person Infected

Every person who, knowing or having reason to believe that he is or may be infected with venereal disease, does or suffers any act which will likely lead to the infection of other persons, shall incur a penalty of not less than \$100 and not more than \$500, or 12 months' imprisonment.

Any person who neglects or disobeys any order given by the Medical Officer of Health or binds or obstructs any officer in the performance of his duties, or without lawful authority publishes or discloses any proceedings taken under this act, shall incur a penalty of not less than \$10 and not more than \$100, or three months in jail.
