In the above table Sulphate of Ammonia is shown as the only source of Nitrogen. In factory practice Cyanamid and Ammonium Nitrate are used in addition. These aggravate further the situation. When Borax or Magnesium is used the quantity of filler is slightly reduced.

2-12-6 and 3-15-6 are largely used for similar crops—Grain, Hay, Turnips and Pastures. The latter contains more plant food and less "other materials", resulting in a lower cost per unit for the plant food.

4-8-10 and 5-10-10 are largely used for Potatoes. The latter contains more plant food and less "other materials", resulting in a lower cost per unit for the plant food.

"Other Materials" is usually Limestone, Sand, or a mixture of both. There is a limit to the quantity of Limestone that can be safely added to Mixed Fertilizers.
