NEW YORK EXCITED OVER "CRIME WAVE"

NEW YORK, April 3.—The controversy over the New York "Crime Wave" received impetus today from many quarters, including a statement from Mayor Gaynor in answer to the charges of Magistrate Joseph B. Corrigan that crime was rampant and the police dormant.

"Do not persist in asking me about Corrigan," the mayor replied. "He is one of those in the city whose heads are filled with vice and crime. How did their heads get so filled with vice and crime? You only have to follow them around at night to find that out. Let those who want to befool this city and picture it as a shameless and vicious place, go right on. Those of us who have to deal with the city intend to go right on with the large things which comfort us."

Magistrate Corrigan merely smiled when the mayor's statement was shown to him. "I do not think that I will say anything more now," he said, "as the matter is where it belongs before the grand jury. Besides, this is not a personal quarrel and the issue is not one of personality."

In an effort to get at a really intelligent idea of how wide is the crime wave, the grand jury which is investigating the question subpoenaed today the officials of half a dozen burglary insurance companies to testify as to the number of burglaries reported in the city since January last.

In addition the hospitals have been asked to furnish figures as to the number of persons blackjacked or otherwise assaulted that have come under their care since January. "The squeal book," a record which the police keep from the public, is also to be inspected by the grand jurors.

"If there is any laxity on the part of the police, it is because they are unable to learn what is required of them." This was the view of Wm. E. Murphy, a former police sergeant, before he testified to the grand jury today. "The average policeman," he continued, "does not know where he stands. If he holds up a suspicious party at night and makes a mistake, he is liable to be called for trial, and that ever afterwards stands as a blot on his record, when he seeks promotion, even though he may be cleared."

John J. Heck, another witness, today, claimed that he had complained to Mayor Gaynor that he was assaulted on the streets last February and alleged that the reply to his complaint was that "Heck must be insane."

Police Commissioner James S. Crosby, was again before the grand jury today.

Later on in the summer Mr. Gallant intends to erect a warehouse 50 x 20 on the inner portion and will install therein his canning machinery, using the upper storey of the new building as a storeroom for the finished cans.—S.

—The cases of varicel in St. Louis are confined entirely to that place and precautions have been taken against the disease spreading. There are now no new cases reported and those who have been ill are convalescent. The Boards of Health of Tignish and Alberton are keeping their districts under surveillance and should anything of a suspicious nature be reported to them they will investigate immediately. The latter board has been reinforced by adding to its number one at Campbellton, Broekton and two at Elmsdale. Other Boards of Health in the county should also take necessary precautions as there are men returning from lumber woods daily at this season of the year and this seems to be the way the epidemic was brought to the Province.—A.

—A very enjoyable evening was spent a few nights ago at the home of Artemas Schurman, Central Bedeque, when a large number of the residents of that place assembled there to bid farewell to George Sutherland and family, T. Johnson and family, Mrs. L. U. Fowler and son and Henry Callbeck, all of whom intend removing to Western Canada. After a short musical programme, Albert Schurman on behalf of the community expressed regret on their departure and conveyed expressions of good will and best wishes for the prosperity of those about to take up their residence in the Great West. Short remarks were also made by several others of those present, to all of which Mr. Sutherland responded expressing on behalf of himself and the others about to leave the community appreciation to the kindly words which were spoken. Refreshments were then furnished by the ladies, which was followed by a short musical programme, which included a number of gramophone selections.—S.

and for thirteen steel bridges, which were permanent, and saved the expense of heavy yearly repairs—gradually the steel bridges would be extended, but for years to come some old bridges must be replaced with wood. As to cold storage, he had only heard one opinion and that was that the Government had no use for it hereafter in Summerside of Georgetown companies could be formed to undertake like plants there he believed the Government would aid them in like manner. He was proud to have assisted in establishing cold storage. Coming to education, he said it should be dealt with on a broad scale. The teachers were not well paid, but the Province with its small revenue was exceeding all others in proportion by its grant for education. He quoted the statistics of other Provinces in regard to education expenditure and concluded that if we are to keep our good teachers the people must make up their minds to pay them more. In the United States the cost of education was about \$30 per head. As to other matters the cost of living had advanced, and the Province, while not more populous than an Ontario municipality had to maintain a provincial expenditure. He said that to strictly enforce the law as it stands would close a great many schools and might work untold injury. Therefore discretion had to be used. He contrasted the Prince of Wales College today with what it was before the Liberals came to power and was proud that we have such an institution which could give an education that was worth a fortune to our young men and young women. He was equally proud of what had been done for Falconwood Hospital and the Infirmary. He referred briefly to the Johnson River school case, the costs of which were paid by the Government. It was not in his locality but five miles away. The Cumiskey in that case was not a brother of his as some had thought. He had no interest whatever in the case, though such had been insinuated. The only question was whether to carry out or repudiate the agreement of the late Premier Peters. He next took up the expenditure on Government House which he defended. The House had become unfit to live in. It had not done the year before because it

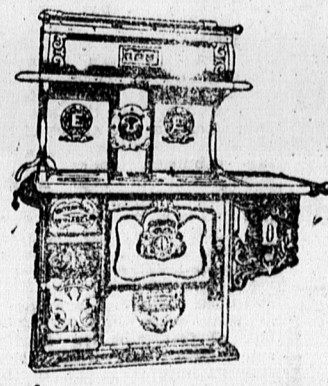
