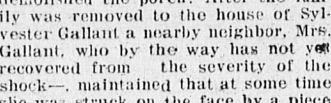

SEVERE ELECTRIC STORM.—Much sympathy is felt for Mr. and Mrs. Morris Gallant, New Acadia in having their house almost completely demolished by lightning during the severe storm Saturday night, two weeks ago. Mr. Gallant has an interesting story to relate about the strange freaks of the lightning in his house. It seems to have entered the flue, for the bricks, cleaned of every particle of mortar were scattered indiscriminately through the different rooms. After the explosion it must have visited every part of the house, for every pane of glass, putty and all, was carried out into the yard, leaving the window sashes intact. After examining all the vandalism possible, it made its exit through a panel in the kitchen door and after reducing the adjoining porch to a little pile of kindling-wood and splinters it made a beeline for the well house which it demolished in the same way as it had demolished the porch. After the family was removed to the house of Sylvester Gallant a nearby neighbor, Mrs. Gallant, who by the way has not yet recovered from the severity of the shock—maintained that at some time she was struck on the face by a piece of board. Of course her husband thought that in her excitement she had imagined it, but on examining what was left of the interior of the house he went to the bed-room, where, sure enough, immediately behind the head was the piece of board, and the hole in the floor through which the electric current had forced its way. The miracle is that the woman who was not more than a foot from it was not killed instantly. The house is damaged almost beyond repair but with the exception of Mrs. Gallant who is quite unnerved by the shock, not one of the family is any the worse for the terrible experience.
