BORDEN TRAIN DELAYED — The early Borden train which was on time and forty minutes late in arriving at Charlottetown last night was delayed due to late train connections on the Mainland.

FARM STAFF PICNIC — The staff of the local Dominion Experimental Farm, including the wives and children of the married employees, will hold a picnic at the National Park tomorrow afternoon.

WHOLESALE VENDOR RETIRES — Mr. Norman MacLeod, who has served for a period of some thirty-five years as wholesale vendor under the Prohibition Act, is on vacation prior to his retirement on superannuation.

WILL CHECK ON WEED-KILLERS — Mr. George Knowles, assistant weeds division, Dominion Experimental Farm, Ottawa, will arrive in the Province over the week-end. He will inspect the work being done at the Farm for the eradication of weeds by various weed-killer compounds now undergoing tests by the technical staff.

POULTRY SHIPMENTS — Upwards of 6,000 fowl and chickens were shipped to American markets this week in two huge tractor-trailer trucks. The birds were shipped by Woodrow Wheatley and Urban McQuaid and were gathered from points in the Province ranging from east of Souris to as far west as Leary. Of that number some 3,000 were this year's chicken.

FIREMEN CALLED — Summerside firemen turned out for an alarm at 1:45 yesterday afternoon from a building on the Tanton mill property owned by Mr. Ray Tanton and occupied by two families but when they got there they could find no fire.

POLIO CASE REPORTED — A case of infantile paralysis in the Bedouque area was reported yesterday. However Dr. B.C. Keppeler, provincial health officer in Charlottetown, said he had not yet been informed of the case. It was understood that precautionary measures such as cutting down on social events, were being undertaken at the Summerside airport. Reports indicated that it was a young man who was ill at Bedouque. Seriousness of his illness was not learned. The case was the first to be reported in the Province since the epidemic in 1946.

BY PLANE TO U.S. HOSPITAL — A United States Army hospital plane from Westover Field, Holyoke, Mass., landed at the local airport on Thursday afternoon to transport Capt. Catherine Dobson, retired, of the U. S. Army Nursing Corps, to the Murphy General Hospital in Waltham, Mass. Capt. Dobson, who had been visiting her mother Mrs. Frank Dixon of North Tryon after being a patient in the Walter Reed Memorial Hospital for fifteen months, became seriously ill last Monday evening and was taken to the Prince Edward Island Hospital. Latest word from Waltham describes her condition as being "very good." A sister, Mrs. Wendell H. Lea, Charlottetown, left by train yesterday to be with Captain Dobson.

RETURNS TO OTTAWA — Dr. E.F. Hopkins, associate director, Experimental Farm Service, Ottawa, leaves this morning after having spent two days on the Island. On Thursday, accompanied by Mr. R.C. Parent, superintendent of the local Experimental Farm, he visited the Illustration Station at New London and expressed his satisfaction at the high quality of the pastures. Yesterday he was taken to the Illustration Station at Monticello in King's County. Dr. Hopkins was accompanied to Monticello by Messrs. Norman Black and George Whiteside of the Experimental Farm staff.

HERE FROM CALIFORNIA — Mr. and Mrs. Wilfrid Gallant of Los Angeles, Calif., have arrived in this Province for a three week's visit. This is Mrs. Gallant's first trip here but Mr. Gallant, a former employee of the Island Telephone Company who left here 28 years ago, is renewing old acquaintances.

PULLETS FOR NEWFOUNDLAND — 3500 pullets left here Thursday night for Newfoundland aboard the freighter Wellington Kent of the Canada-Newfoundland steamship lines. They were shipped by Woodrow Wheatley and were accompanied by Mr. Wheatley's Newfoundland agent, Faup Youtan. The pullets consisted of Barred Rocks, New Hampshire Reds, White Leghorns and Light Sussex and were ready to go into production in Newfoundland where eggs are wholesaling at 72 cents per dozen.

TRINITY CHOR PICNIC — On Wednesday the choir of Trinity United Church held a most enjoyable picnic at the summer cottage of the Misses Tait at Lowest Point. About fifty members and friends assembled and spent a jolly afternoon and evening by the shore. Delicious refreshments were served on the lawn. The party concluded with a sing-song and a moonlight swim.

CHARGED UNDER NEW ACT — Ten men charged under the new Temperance Act were the first prosecutions under this Act to come before Magistrate Gilbert Gaudet. One pleaded guilty to being intoxicated in a public place, while the other pleaded guilty to having liquor in his possession in a place other than his residence, as required by the Act. Each received the minimum fine of \$20 and costs or 30 days for such offences. Two men charged with speeding were fined \$10 and costs or 10 days, and a man charged with operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated was sentenced to 7 days in the Queen's County Jail.
