SUCCESS OF PRESBYTERIAN SUMMER SCHOOL

Plans Made for Next Year's Summer School and Missionary Conference.

The closing session of the Presbyterian Summer School and Missionary Conference, which met at Canoe Cove August 5th - 12th was held on the evening of Monday August 12th and on Tuesday forenoon the last group of leaders and students set out for their respective homes.

The School throughout was a splendid success in every way. Taking leaders and students together there were sixty in all enrolled.

The opening meeting was held on the evening of Monday August 5th. Rev. R. Hensley Staver, presided and was assisted in the devotional part of the service by Rev. Thos. A. Rodger.

Rev. F. G. McIntosh gave the opening address. It was a very fitting one. His subject was "The Power of the Holy Spirit." The speaker made it very clear to all that one of the great needs of the Church of Christ today is the baptism of the Holy Spirit. Before the Spirit of God can do His work in the hearts of men and women so that they may become a force for righteousness in the world they must be baptized of self. The church is sounding out the call to its members today to reconsecrate themselves to the Master's service, to wait upon God in meditation and prayer until their hearts are cleansed and the Holy Spirit can rule and reign in their lives. For only in proportion as the Spirit of God dwells in the hearts of men and women can they have power to help redeem the world.

Assembled thus as we are at our Summer School and Missionary Conference we must wait upon God and ask Him to prepare the hearts of all that His Spirit may work mightily therein. So that the meetings to be held for the instruction and up-building of the lives of our young people will not have been held in vain.

Following this came a short address by Rev. R. Hensley Staver on "The Possibilities of Youth." Mr. Staver called attention to the wonderful power of early training. We must never forget that "The child is father to the man." What the boy is in the great essential of life in his boyhood days that he will be in his manhood years. True manhood cannot be carved out by one stroke in a passing instant. No, it must be builded day by day and hour by hour. This fact must be brought home to our young people with force so that they may ever build aright. Canada is a great country and a great country needs great men, and more particularly great leaders. We need these great men in every walk of life, and especially in this true of the men in the ministry of the Church of Christ. We must have great men in the pulpits of our land if we are ever to become a great people. If these men are not to be found in the ranks of the present generation we must mould them out of the boys of the coming generation.

In order to assist the home and the school the Sabbath School and the Young People's Societies in this work of training the youth it has been found that Summer Schools and Missionary Conference have been very helpful. It is then our duty as workers in the church of Christ to train up leaders, leaders not only among the young men, but also leaders, among the young women of our land, leaders all of whom shall be worthy of a country such as ours. May we then one and all realize not only what a great and responsible task has been given to us but also what a great privilege is ours and may we all be found faithful to the very last.

After the addresses were over and the regular meeting had been formally closed a social half hour was spent in becoming acquainted. The evening throughout was a very pleasant as well as a very inspiring one and all present felt assured that the school was away to a good start.

The lectures in the several courses began on Tuesday morning and continued through until the closing of the school on the following Monday. All of the lectures given by the different leaders on the various subject were found to be very helpful. Each day from 9 to 9.50 A. M. the lectures on Bible Study were given by Rev. Thos. A. Rodger.

The general theme of the study for the six lectures could be well described by the one word "Salvation." The very word salvation said the lecturer implies that there is something to be saved from. In His word God leaves no doubt as to man's condition by nature all men are in a state of being lost. "There is none righteous no not one" Man's only hope is in the cross of Jesus Christ. The cross has a three-fold message for a sin-cursed world. It reveals (1) The great Love of God (2) The awfulness of sin and (3) the righteousness of God.

Every human being in the world is being energized either by the spirit of God or the spirit of the devil. But even in the midst of a world such as this God is able not only to save but to keep "If then God be for us who, asks the apostle Paul, can be against us. He that spared not His only Son "but delivered him up for us all" how shall He not with Him freely give us all things." The people in the different branches of the Church of Christ to day should be striking the note of victory to a far greater degree than they are, and all followers of Jesus Christ should have a far greater passion for souls than they have. All such should never forget that they are "saved to serve" and they each should be continually striving to do their part. The reward for their zeal and faithfulness is unquestioned. The promises of God are as sure and as eternal as Himself. "Heaven and Earth shall pass away but the word of God endureth forever."

These lectures and the discussions which arose out of them were found to have been very interesting and instructive. The lectures on Sunday School Methods and Young people's work from 10 - 10.50 A. M. each day were given by Miss Edna Rogers, Deaconess, New Glasgow, N. S. and by Rev. D. O. McKay Elmsdale, N. S. On account of having to give a series of lectures at the Summer School at Picton Mr. McKay was not able to reach Canoe Cove until Thursday August 8th. The greater number of the lectures were given by Miss Rogers. This course included lectures on "The Pupil" "The Teacher" "The Art of Asking Questions" "The use of Illustrations" "Work among Girls" and other kindred subjects. Both Miss Rogers and Mr. McKay showed that they had a good grasp of their subjects. The lectures were helpful to all, and especially to those engaged in S. School and Young People's work.

The lectures on Missions from 11-11.40 each day were given by Miss Hazel Dean and Miss Edna Rogers. This course included lectures on Home

Missions in Canada, or India, British Guiana, Farnosa, China, Manchuria and Japan. When plans were being made for holding the Summer School and Missionary Conference it was understood that Rev. Dr. Buchanan returned missionary from India would be in the Maritime Provinces in the month of August; and it was expected that he would be present to give lectures on missions but on account of having met with quite a serious automobile accident, he was not able to make the trip to the Eastern Provinces. In the absence of Dr. Buchanan or any other returned missionary Miss Rogers and Miss Dean handled the course splendidly. The course was full of instruction for all.

The series of lectures on The Presbyterian Church, History, Doctrine and Policy were given by a number of different men, one each day from 11.50-12.30 P. M. The first lecture of the series was given by Rev. F. G. McIntosh. His subject was "The Founding of the Church and its early History." The second lecture was on "John Calvin and was given by Rev. W. Bruce Muir." The third lecture in the series was given by Dr. F. S. V. Bruce Williams. His subject was "The Sovereignty of God."

The fourth lecture was on "Presbyterianism, its out standing Doctrines and was given by Rev. D. O. McKay, Elmsdale, N. S. The fifth lecture was given by Rev. Geo. E. Ross D. D. of Ottawa. This was also on "Presbyterianism—its form of Church Government, Policy etc. The sixth lecture was on "The Great need of the present and the outlook for the Future." and was given by Rev. R. Hensley Staver. All of the men dealt with their respective subjects in a masterly way. This course was found to have been one of the most instructive and helpful of the series.

The afternoons were given up to sports of various kinds. The most popular of all the sports were, baseball, volleyball, quoits and swimming. On Friday afternoon August 9th a Field Day of sports was held. All of the contests were entered into with zest and enthusiasm. Needless to say these afternoon sports from day to day were enjoyed by all.

The Twilight addresses were held each evening at 7.30 o'clock and were as follows— (1) "The Three Fold challenge of Life" (2) "The Secret of Peace", (3) "The Appeal of the Future" were, all given by Dr. F. S. V. Bruce Williams. (4) "God's plan for every Life" by Rev. D. O. McKay. (5) "The Master's Ideal for Life" (6) "The Crime of Doing Nothing" by Rev. R. Hensley Staver.

Many words of commendation were spoken in favour of these several addresses. They will not soon be forgotten.

At 9 P. M. all of the young people of the Presbyterian church and the young people of the Churches of Christ on P. E. After the more humorous part of the entertainment around the camp fire each evening, came the singing of a hymn followed by a good night talk. The good night talks on the several evenings were as follows— (1) "The call to service." Rev. Geo. E. Ross D. D. (2) "The need of quiet and Rest." Rev. W. Bruce Muir. (3) "The curse of selfishness." Edwin White. (4) "The solemnity of Life." Rev. W. L. Outhouse. (5) "The kind of world we live in." H. A. Dolg. (6) "The Lost Boy." Miss Marion Royce.

These short gripping talks were listened to with rapt attention, the singing of a Hymn and the benediction brought each days proceedings to a close. After the lecture period had closed on Saturday a short business meeting was held. Among other things it was unanimously that the thanks of the Summer School and Missionary conference be extended to the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island for having held the Summer School and Missionary conference which had proved to have been such a splendid success in every way. And it was further agreed that the Presbytery be asked to hold a similar Summer School and Missionary Conference during the first week of August 1928.

And again on Monday afternoon another short business meeting was held at which two committees was appointed, a smaller and a larger one. The following, smaller or more general committee was appointed to cooperate with the Presbytery Committee on Sabbath Schools and young People's work in getting ready for next years work namely: Angus M. Bernard, Freetown, Annie McKay, Freetown and Donna Rodger, Belfast.
