NEW YORK, May 17—New York may be a shaveless city as nearly as the barbers can make it such after Sunday next, according to leaders among the men today who announce that demands for improved working conditions and higher pay for Saturday and Sunday work have been submitted to employers, with a time limit ultimatum attached. The barbers object to going to work before 8 a. m., of working after 9 p. m. Minimum wages of \$11 a week are demanded.

The following despatch from Minneapolis will be of interest to Methodists in this province: Unless the general conference of the Methodist Episcopal church overrules the action of that committee on state of the church that part of the famous paragraph 260 of the church discipline, which especially prohibits dancing, card playing and kindred amusements will remain a law of the church. By a report of 100 to 51 the entire committee voted to reject the report by the majority of the sub-committee which favored the elimination of a portion of the paragraph and leaving the amusement question to the "conscience" of the individual member.

The S.S. A. W. Perry, having been delayed last week on account of heavy freight from Boston, and being further delayed by fog and reported collision, has caused the cancellation of this week's sailing. Mr. Nicoll, the agent at Charlottetown, having received a telegram stating the steamer was sailing for Halifax only this trip. The steamer Halifax will leave Halifax for Boston Wednesday night and take up the Island service. The steamer Perry will remain at Halifax for annual overhauling and fitting out and will resume the summer service towards the end of June, both steamers coming to the Island, the Perry acting as second steamer until the arrival of the Evangeline.

Rev. Dr. Heartz, a native of Charlottetown, has returned to Amherst from Minneapolis, where he had been attending a Conference of the Methodist Episcopal body of the United States including the missionaries and missionary bishops to foreign lands under the control of the M.E. Church of the United States. Dr. Heartz, and J. M. Aikens, K. C., M. P., of Winnipeg, were the delegates from Canada to represent the Methodist denomination in the northern part of this continent. Dr. Heartz said that he had a delightful time during the week spent in Minneapolis. The Conference was made up of a most cosmopolitan character. There were eight hundred and fifteen delegates present, twenty-seven of whom were ladies. One was a grand-daughter of Garibaldi, the famous hero of Italian independence. There was a talented Chinese lady present besides turbaned Hindus and representatives from many European countries and from different parts of Asia and Africa. On Sunday evening, May 5th, Dr. Heartz had the pleasure of preaching in the First Methodist Church of Minneapolis and at the close of the services, a score or more of Canadians voluntarily came to the pulpit to shake hands with him and make themselves known as former Canadian citizens. Prior to the close of the conference Dr. Heartz was asked to deliver a short farewell address and following it a resolution of appreciation was unanimously passed by the Conference thanking Dr. Heartz for his address and for his visit to the gathering bearing the greetings from the Methodists of Canada.

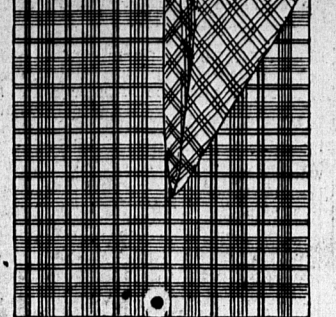
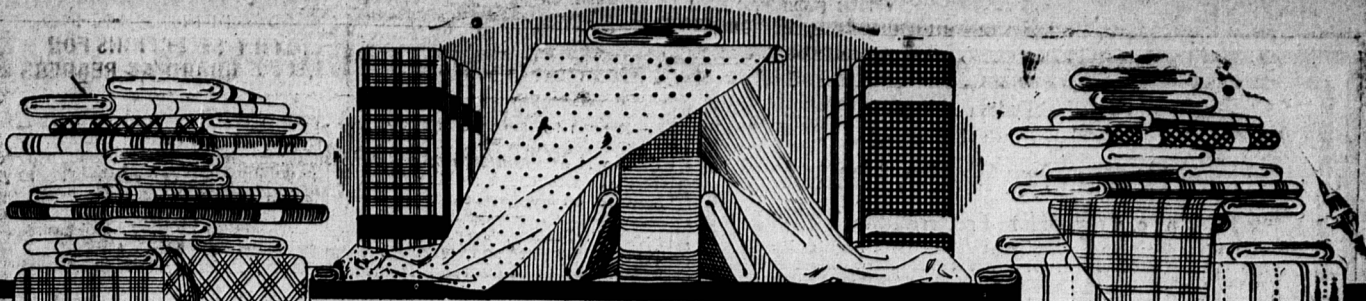
J. B. Brown, Dentist, Charlottetown, went west Saturday afternoon, in response to news of the illness of his brother who is teaching school at Grand River.

R. Brown, York, with Plymouth Rocks, fifth prize, George Crockett, with Plymouth Rocks; sixth prize, Mr. Day, York, with a flock of different breeds. Mr. Brodie gave a statement of what it cost to feed his hens for the three months and the number of eggs sold which showed that there was money in keeping hens and attending to them. The Institute then adjourned until after planting.
