

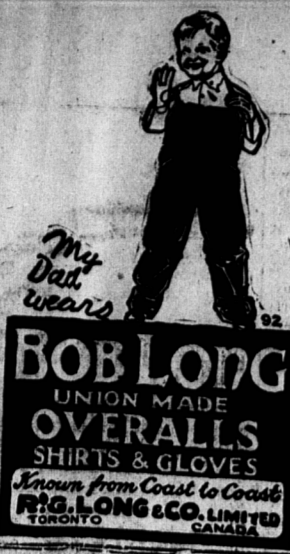

**QUEBEC, Oct. 6**—Another special Canadian Government railway train reached Levis last night from an Atlantic port with 400 more inviolated soldiers arriving from overseas. This makes a total of 1,600 men arriving here since morning.

**BASEL, Oct. 6**—General Groenes has been appointed to succeed General Von Stein who resigned as Prussian Minister of war, the Strasbourg Post says.

**PERTH AMBOY, Oct. 6**—Another terrific explosion of a T N T magazine occurred at 10.05 a. m. Saturday Buildings rocked in Perth Amboy. As a measure of precaution the authorities have ordered the evacuation of all towns within a ten mile radius of Morman.

**AMSTERDAM, Oct. 5**—The proclamation of the independence of Bohemia will be issued shortly, according to the Budapest newspaper Azev. The members of the Czech national committee fear neither prison nor death, says the newspaper. They have all made their wills and settled their material affairs and the independence of Bohemia is virtually assured.

All preparations have been made for the proclamation of the independence of Bohemia. Every portfolio has been distributed and the state programme is ready while Czech money is circulating privately.

**TORONTO, Oct. 5**—In raising \$181,224 for the Catholic Huts Toronto surpassed its objective by more than \$31,224.

**BERLIN, (via London) Oct. 5**—Vigorous enemy attacks on both sides of Roulers north of St Quentin at the Chemin Desdames and in Champagne were repulsed, says the Evening Report from general headquarters between the Argonne and the Meuse. Renewed American attempts to break through failed.

**U.S. TROOPS ABROAD NOW 1,800,000**

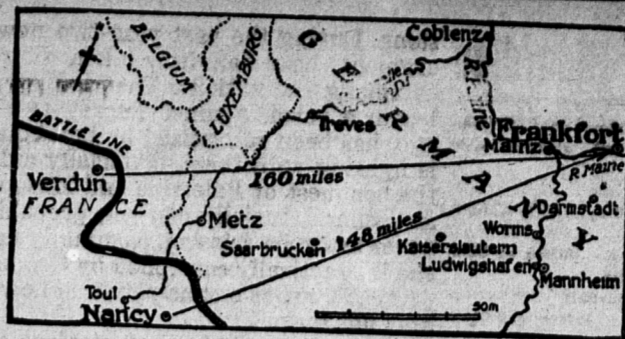
WASHINGTON, Oct. 5.—American troops abroad now number 1,800,000, members the House Military Committee were informed today at their weekly conference at the War Dept.

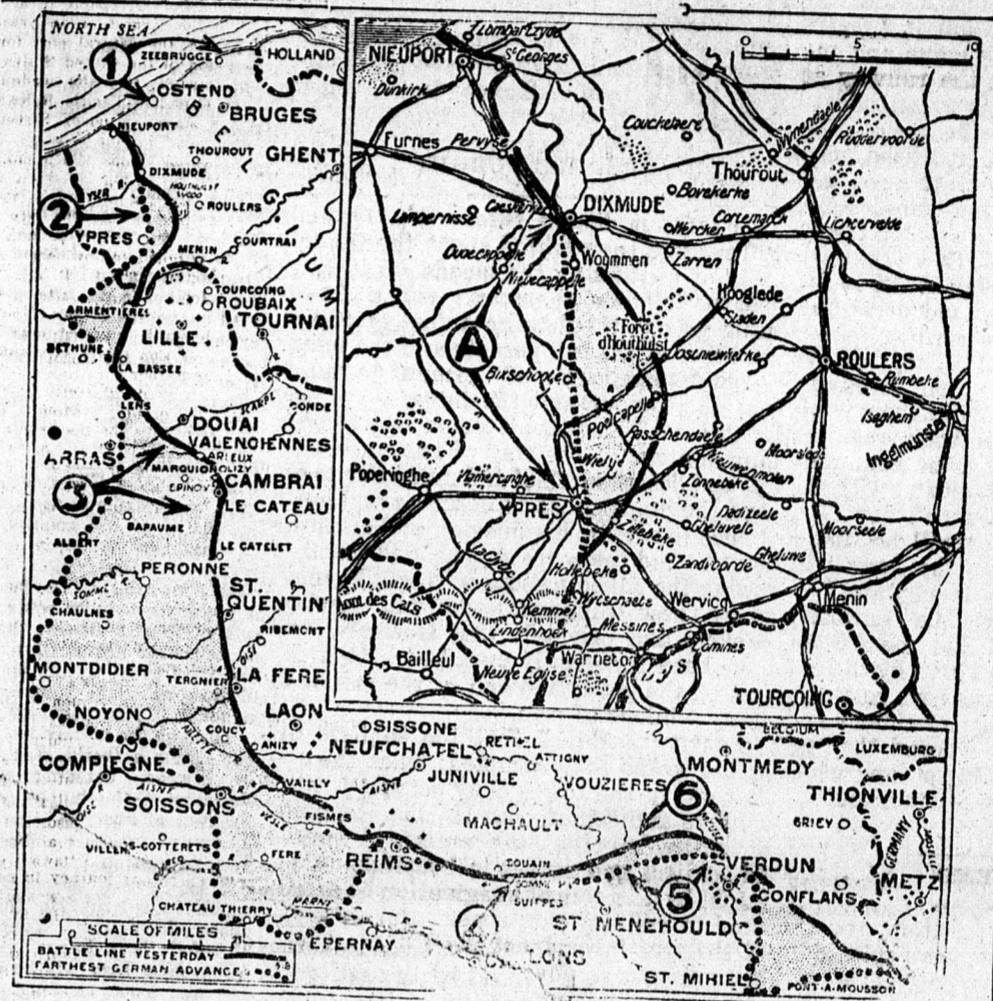


## BOMBING OF FRANKFORT

## WAR MAP

This combination map gives a good personal command of King Albert's idea of the manner in which the Belgian work of salving Belgium are smashing the Germans all along a 250 mile front. The figure 1 in the large map at the right, and so shows where British warships bombarded Ostend and Zeebrugge as a preliminary to an important military move in Belgium; 2 is the point at which British and Belgians, under the command of King Albert, have been set on fire by the Germans as a sure indication that they have abandoned this important point. The figures 4 and 5 point to the areas where the French and Americans are sweeping back the enemy on the right of the line; and 6 is the point at which the Germans are making their last stand around Verdun.

## IN MEMORIAM

JAMES CAREW
