WHILE George Ross and his sister, of Bridgetown, were returning last Sunday from Fortune Head where they were visiting their brother Neil Ross, they met with an unfortunate accident. Owing to the bad condition of the roads, the horse stumbled and fell, overturning the sleigh and throwing out the occupants. Before they had time to recover from the shock the frightened animal ran away breaking the sleigh to pieces. Mr. Ross went in search of the animal, and found him in Kenneth Morrison's field.

ON Wednesday evening a number of the students of the C. B. C. in company with a few of the youth of Charlottetown, numbering in all about twenty couples, crossed to Southport to spend the evening at the home of Solomon Mutch. Games of all kinds were indulged in by the party and dancing was, by no means, in the background. The young ladies had prepared luncheon which was enjoyed by all and goes to show that they were not lacking in this respect. The party felt much indebted to their host and hostess for the very hospitable manner in which they were received, and join in wishing that this may not be the last time they will have the privilege of spending an evening with them. After wishing them God-speed and expressing their appreciation of the kindness bestowed upon them, the party left on return for the city in the wee small hours of the morning.

HERBERT BARBOUR, a well known St. John man representing Upper Canadian houses, and a son of M. G. Barbour, who died January 19, was in Prince Edward Island when his father became seriously ill. Efforts were made to find Mr. Barbour, but it was not until Saturday night that he was located at Souris, the telegram sent to him having been delayed on account of the break in the cable to the Island. Mr. Barbour drove for the greater part of Saturday night from Souris to Georgetown, in the midst of a blinding snow storm, and left Georgetown early Monday morning on the steamer Minto. He was delayed at Pictou and at Truro on the way to St. John, but arrived there Saturday morning expecting to find his father still alive as of course he had had no word in the meantime. Mr. Barbour was thus three days on the trip from Souris to St. John, and owing to the failure of the telegraph missed seeing his ailing father.

At the Police Court yesterday the cases against Callaghan and Reddin for violation of the Prohibition Act, were postponed for a week. The cases against Annie Coyle and Patrick McAleer were heard on the evidence of Noel Abraham, the Indian of Mowell River, who recently gave evidence in the Supreme Court in the assault case against Power and King. He swore that he bought a bottle of whisky from McAleer and some beer from Mrs. Coyle, but would not swear that the beer had any intoxicating effects. The case against Mrs. Coyle was dismissed. For McAleer it was contended by his counsel that the sale of intoxicating liquor to an Indian constitutes an offence under the Dominion Indian Act, and that therefore as a constitutional question it could not be punished under the Provincial Prohibition Act. Judgment in the latter case was reserved for a week. E. O. Brown for Mrs. Coyle and Patrick Callaghan.
