Mr. Brenton Shumblies arrived in the city on Thursday evening to visit his relatives and friends. His many friends will wish him a pleasant holiday.

The Princess arrived in port shortly after nine o'clock yesterday evening having on board 58 passengers 55 of whom were returning from the Halifax Exhibition.

Six hundred barrels of mackerel from the Magdalen Islands will be brought to the city today by the Prince Edward Island Railway for shipment by the Boston Boat.

The steamer City of Ghent arrived in port at 12 o'clock yesterday and sailed again at seven with a full general cargo consisting in part of 250 bags oats and 120 bags potatoes shipped by Mr. John Wheatley.

Mrs. Carvell who is now at Hampton, N. B., received painful injuries on Saturday last by being thrown out of her carriage. Happily no bones were broken but Mrs. Carvell has been confined to her couch ever since.

At 8.50 yesterday evening an alarm of fire in the boiler room of Mr. E. D. Stern's Laundry, Water Street, was sent in. The blaze occurred just on the right hand side of the boiler, and was under control when the firemen arrived.

Mr. J. F. Owen has resigned his position upon the teaching staff of West Kent School. It is understood Mr. Owen will be attached to the survey staff of the Murray Harbor Railway. He leaves to commence work on Monday morning.

YESTERDAY morning Isaac Clark of Cape Traverse, a brakeman on the morning train from Summerside to Charlottetown received a painful injury while pushing a car out of the siding at Kenastation. The stick used doubled up and squeezed the injured man against a car standing alongside, causing injuries to his back which will confine him to his home for a number of days. Mr. Clark was unable to walk and was removed to his home last night.

The intimation that Mr. John Copp of Milton Station intends selling his splendid farm at Milton Station will be learned with interest. Mr. Copp's farm is some 8 miles from Charlottetown and contains 125 acres with good dwelling house and outbuildings. The farm will be sold in one block or in two parts. If not disposed of by private sale previously to suit purchasers, sale will take place on September 29th at the hour of 12 o'clock noon.

YESTERDAY THE GUARDIAN was furnished a sample of fish glue put up and warranted by Lawson & Co., of this City. Glue is supposed to be a viscid cement or adhesive preparation derived from boiling certain substances to be melted or applied in liquid form. Liquid or glue kept fluid when cold needs skill in preparation. In this regard the sample shown is particularly adhesive and glutinous and is among the first class preparations on the market. It retails at 10 cents a bottle.

As evidence of the possibilities of plant growth in P. E. Island under favorable conditions is afforded by a specimen to be seen in Mr. George Carter's garden. The plant in question is a Rianisor Castor Oil Plant. Its size is notable for being entirely the growth of this season. It stands eight feet high, and is fully 20 feet in circumference. One of its luxuriant green leaves measures three feet across. This is an especially fine plant for a lawn ornament. In tropical countries it is grown for the beans from which castor oil is extracted. The plant does not produce mature fruit in this northern latitude, its use being for ornament.

YESTERDAY the police arrested a man charged with going on board the Stanley and taking possession of a watch and \$3.25 cents the property of a man named Laughlin Martin who works on the steamer. During the day the prisoner attempted to make a sale of the watch at the Railway station for \$12. When the prisoner arrived at the station the search of his person disclosed two watches and \$51.50. In his stocking was found a leather purse containing nine dollars. In his pocket was found an order from the manager of the Springhill coal mines instructing the underground manager to give Alphonso Lesone work in slope number 2. The order is dated Aug. 16. The prisoner states that he came to the city by the Princess a few evenings ago and intended taking passage by the Boston boat but made a mistake in the wharf and went on board the Stanley. He also states that the money and watches are his own personal property and makes inquiries as to the length of time he will be detained in the station. The prisoner is apparently about 22 years of age, well dressed and wears a costly ring on his left hand. The watch which seems to be his own is a good one and indicates that he keeps only the best of jewelry. He also states that he belongs to Boston and made a mistake by coming to P. E. Island.
