AN OPPORTUNITY FOR STATESMANSHIP.

What is the function of true statesmanship but to serve and save the state?

To build equally, with a firm hand, on sure foundations and with well-tempered mortar, from the gilded turrets at Ottawa westward to the Pacific and eastward to the Atlantic.

Bad faith is bad mortar in nation building. Canada has built some towers which have toppled down because the mortar was bad!

"Behold him proudly view some pompous pile
Whose high dome swells to emulate the skies
And smile and say, 'My name shall live with this
Till time shall be no more.'
When at his feet, yea at his very feet
The fallen fabric of the other day
Teaches the solemn lesson."

Not thus should we build our national structure. "The faith of every man Canadian in Canada, the faith of every Province in its sister Province" is the only cement that can hold together the massive stones of our national edifice. This faith untimely lost, must be restored.

Here then is the great opportunity for the constructive and conserving statesmanship of the hour; to restore the faith, the confidence and the prosperity of the Eastern Provinces, and to build them up along with and equally with the Centre and the West.

The statesman who builds securely will find his fame secure. And it is as much the work of true statesmanship to relieve grievances and remove all just cause of discontent in the East as to add new Provinces in the West.

It is as much the function of true statesmanship to check the depleting exodus, (largely to the United States) from the Maritime Provinces, as it is to promote immigration to the western prairies.

A contented and prosperous East means the early accession of Newfoundland, which is otherwise impossible. Nothing has so blocked the way to union with Newfoundland as the stagnant and decadent condition of the Maritime Provinces, especially of Prince Edward Island, with their losses of population and representation.

No other measure in our judgment would do so much to restore the confidence, to retain the population, to develop the industry, trade and prosperity of the Eastern Provinces as would the construction of the Missing Link at the Cape, thereby giving them constant railway connection with each other.

That work is vital to the salvation of Prince Edward Island. It is necessary to New Brunswick and Nova Scotia and to the commercial and industrial development of the entire Maritime section of the Dominion.

It would fulfil the broken terms of union; it would quiet the prevalent and dangerous discontent; set free the springs of legitimate trade; give industrial life and activity to Prince Edward Island and stop the alarming exodus.

Here then is the great opportunity for national statesmanship to greatly serve and save the state; to atone for the long injustice of the past; to cement forever the broken bond of mutual faith and to complete our vast but unfinished system of interprovincial communication.

The material gain would be incalculable; the moral strength restored would be equally great. The national fabric would stand completed in fair proportions, and the statesmanship that undertook this work would be crowned with a noble and enduring monument.

MONTREAL WITNESS SPEAKS OUT.

We are thankful to the Montreal Witness for having quoted largely from The Guardian's article, 'In and Out of the Union, contrasting the positions of Prince Edward Island and Newfoundland. "The facts are dismal," says The Witness, "but not to dispute, the only trouble is to find out the actual cause. . . . The Guardian says rightly 'We prospered and grew before the Union. . . . And at the same time when Prince Edward Island entered Confederation she was promised that constant connection would be maintained with the Mainland and that has not been done. If a Tunnel is the remedy on which they have set their hearts they ought to have it, but would the Tunnel act as a panacea?' The Witness questions whether the National Policy be not to blame for a part of our ills, as it probably is, and concludes with the sentence, "Free trade as well as a Tunnel might have quite remarkable results."

We know right well the author of the article in the editorial columns of The Patriot headed "Political Vaudeville," and the author of previous articles that have appeared in the same columns, not written by Editor Nash. If this writer

has the courage, let him write over his own proper signature. Otherwise it may become our duty to strip off his mask.

AN APPEAL TO THE THRONE.

The staff correspondent of the St. John Sun, the principal organ of the Laurier Government in that city, announces that at the coming session of the Legislature the Provincial Government will formulate an appeal to King Edward, claiming on behalf of this Province a fulfillment of the terms of union with Canada, hitherto denied us. The correspondent appears to have had it confirmed by a member of the Government.

We give up large space today to The Sun correspondent's letter. He visited the Island to learn the facts regarding the unrest and discontent now prevailing here and spent ten days in a searching investigation. He finds "the situation in Prince Edward Island is most serious and cannot be regarded lightly."

It is gratifying to find that the Government of Premier Poirer has come to a like conclusion and is now disposed to take energetic action toward ending the crisis in some way.

The Guardian regrets to learn of the serious illness of Bishop McDonell, who has not been well for some months and has been confined to the palace for a week past. Yesterday he was removed to the Charlottetown Hospital. His Lordship passed a fairly good day yesterday and was sleeping when inquiries were made at the Hospital at a late hour last night.

THE ALBERTON INQUEST.

Sir, I do not rise to defend the brutal article which appeared in The Patriot relative to a death that occurred at Alberton, and which was copied into The Guardian; but I do wish to make some remarks on inquests in general, and on the one that was held recently at Alberton in particular.

The usually paucity of character of inquests held in this Province is no orious. There is usually no effort made to fix responsibility, or to point out to the public dangers that are hidden from them, and that beset them unawares, and to which they sometimes fall victims, as I am convinced happened to the unfortunate man who died recently.

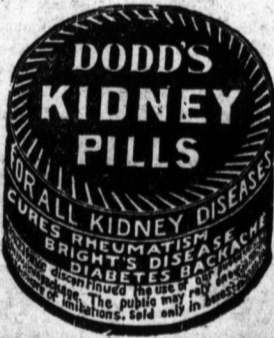
It was a well known fact that he had been drinking, and I take it that it was the duty of the Coroner to try and find out who had sold him the liquor in violation of the laws of this Province. But not the slightest effort was made either to elicit this fact or to fix the responsibility upon those who violate the law.

It was proved before the Coroner's court that he had drunk tea and beef, iron and wine. It was pointed out that cheap grades of bay rum often contain wood alcohol. And it was the opinion of the only person who appeared before the Court competent of forming an opinion, that the group of symptoms from which he was suffering was caused by wood alcohol. Yet in the face of this evidence the Coroner made no serious effort to find out who manufactured this bay rum and if it contains wood alcohol.

The public safety demands that this should be done. For it is a fact well known to medical men that when applied externally to the body for oil purposes, wood alcohol may be absorbed and produce serious or even fatal poisoning.
