On Saturday morning at 6 o'clock, while getting up to go to work, John McKinnon of St. John dropped dead from heart disease. He had not been working all week but was about all day, complaining only of general weakness. His death is a great shock to the community and the stricken family have much sympathy. The deceased was born in P. E. Island nearly sixty-six years ago and, with his parents, moved to Scotch settlement, Westmoreland county, where he spent his boyhood. He worked at the blacksmith business all his life. He had been a resident of Norton for twenty years and was in business until two years ago, since when he had been employed in the branch railway shops. Three brothers, Donald, Joseph and Malcolm of Moncton; and three sisters, Mrs. Jonah, of Norwood; Mrs. Conley, of Boston, and Mrs. E. B. Trites, of Moncton, besides his mother, who is now more than ninety years of age, survive him.

The following clipping which is taken from the Worcester Post of a recent date will be of intense interest in this Province. Miss Christine J. Miller, a graduate of the City Hospital training school with the class of '04, who volunteered as a nurse during the Spanish war while she gave untiring service among the sick soldiers, has been since February, until a few days ago in one of the wards of the hospital dangerously sick with consumption. Two years ago, Dr. F. H. Baker sent Miss Miller out west to Arizona, where she had a sister and brother. She took up a government claim, built a log cabin, and expected to make it her home, but, wanting to come East again and see her friends, she came to Worcester, brought furnishings for her cabin and sent them to Arizona. She was taken with a cold during the winter and consumption set in. The doctors had given up all hope for her and one of her closest friends, Miss Laura Gordon, another nurse, gave up her duties to take care of her friend. When Miss Miller's cry to be taken home to die became insistent, Miss Gordon resolved to shoulder the responsibility and started a week ago for Nova Scotia prepared for the worst. Miss Miller has a mother who is 80 years old in Prince Edward Island, and she wanted to see her again before she died. She took her on a stretcher in the baggage car from Worcester to Boston, and in a Pullman car to Nova Scotia and from there to Prince Edward Island on a steamer. Word has reached Worcester that while she is still alive, her pulse was 180 and her temperature 104.

Badly listed to port and with her forward compartments full of water, the Plant Rier A. W. They found a number of plates injured near the bow, but the full extent of her damage will not be ascertained until another survey is held, probably today.
