THE BAD OLD TIMES.

"Say not thou what is the cause that the former days were better than these! For thou dost not inquire, wisely concerning this." The citation from a writing more than two thousand eight hundred years old serves to show that in those days when the world was comparatively young, there were persons as they are today who thought the former times were better than the present. To all such the gentle and delicate reminder comes that they are unwise in assuming that the former days were really the better days.

There are men still in active life who can remember the time when there was not a railway, a street car, a telegraph, a telephone, an electric light, a mowing or reaping machine in the whole of British North America; when a letter from Toronto to Charlottetown was three weeks in transit and cost two shillings and nine pence for postage, and a letter from England was taxed from five shillings to seven shillings and six pence in postage; when there were no Atlantic cables or steamship lines; when cooking stoves had not come into use; when cholera swept the great cities almost unchecked; when painless operations in surgery were almost unknown.

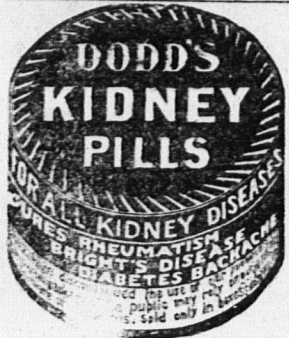
If we turn from such material things to matters of civil and religious liberty, what were the conditions of seventy years ago? Responsible Government had not come to our Province; we were ruled by irresponsible oligarchies; one church was wedded to the state and all others were barely tolerated; a Dissenter from the Established Church could not hold office in some Provinces even as Justice of the Peace or Constable; and pastors of Methodist and Baptist churches were prosecuted and imprisoned for daring to solemnize marriage between members of their own congregations.

And in matters of morals and religion what were the conditions prevailing? The average sermon embodied a direct attack upon some other church or the doctrine held by it; Protestant was arrayed against Catholic, Dissenter against Churchman, Baptist against Methodist and Presbyterian, Armenian against Calvinist, New Light against Old Light. And every where the open tavern stood at the roadside, while the decanter and the rum bottle were in almost every home. Every bar-raising or chopping-trail, every militia training or fair day was a drinking bout.

Not perhaps in all ways has moral and spiritual advancement kept pace with the stupendous material progress of our time, but the agencies for good have multiplied and war is waged upon the giant evils of drunkenness, vice and crime as never before. Human slavery has been abolished. The brotherhood of all races is recognized as never before. Arbitration disposes of national quarrels in scores of cases where war would have resulted in past ages. Such are a few of the many indications that the world is "rolling out of darkness into light," and that the days in which we live are the best yet seen, with bright prospects of yet better days to come.

King Edward is receiving a visit from his imperial nephew the German Emperor. Such an interchange of courtesies between the rulers of Britain and Germany could not have been possible at all times during the past ten years. Fortunately at the present time comparatively good feeling prevails between the two related rulers and the two related peoples, and this our wise and peace-loving King has done very much to bring about.

The wanton and malicious destruction of a concrete culvert in the road at Johnson's River bridge has called forth the offer of a reward of twenty-five dollars from the Commissioner of Public Works for such information as will lead to the conviction of the guilty party or parties. This reward is advertised in another column of today's Guardian and we sincerely hope and trust that it may prove effective in eliciting the evidence required. The perpetrator of such wanton destruction of public property well deserves the severe penalty which the law sets down for such offences.
